realize that we are not financially able to run the pool. This is where SRAC comes in and the funding they would need to bring in to retain a pool.

"We are exploring whether or not SRAC is going to be able to raise enough funds to make the pool viable. We are exploring all options, wellness center, community center, meeting place, all the different options that came out of the meeting last Friday."

Three SRAC members will make a presentation to the Mapleton School Board tonight. Their goal will be to get approval from the district to seek funding for the pool.

"We hope to get the blessing of the district that if the funding is acquired then the district would sign the documents necessary, such as grants, and take seriously the plan to revive the pool," Hesse said.

The meeting starts at 6 p.m. in the library of the Mapleton High School at 10868 E. Mapleton Road.

connected with the local case, when Portland police were searching for a man who they said has been involved in a number of criminal pursuits, during one of which police allege the suspect threw pipe bombs out the vehicle's window during a chase. None of the bombs detonated, but they were fully functional, police said.

Lt. John Pitcher of the FPD said that a motive for placing the bombs has never been clear.

The Portland Police Bureau, after receiving a tip, arrested Neal Allen Panschow, 44, on Dec. 21 in Multnomah County. The bureau said that Panschow has outstanding warrants in Multnomah and Tillamook counties.

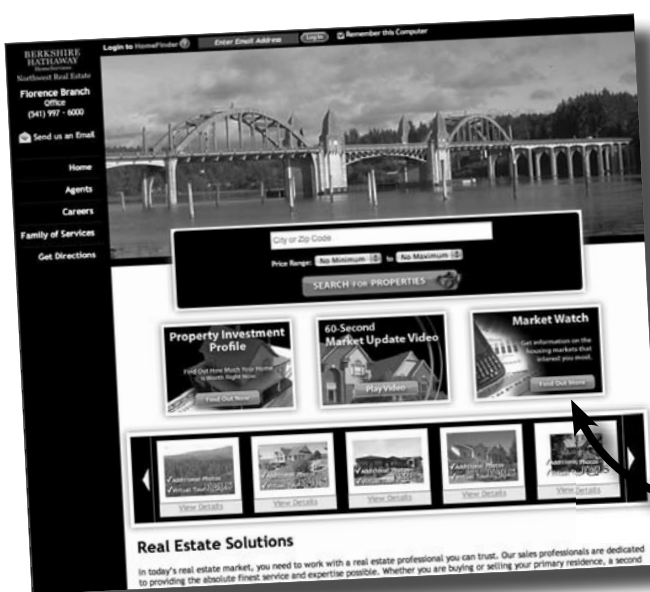
The materials in the four pipe bombs ejected from the eluding vehicle, a 2002 silver Honda Civic, connect the Florence and Portland incidents.

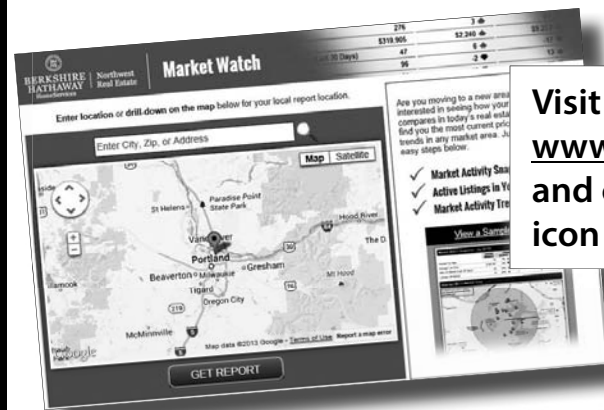
