SMS students join Teen Activities Project research

What is happening in the lives of teenagers these days? Siuslaw Middle School

eighth-grade students are being invited to participate in the Teen Activities Project (TAP), a study of teenagers' social experiences, moods and activities. Scientists from Oregon Research Institute are using cutting-edge technology to understanding the different influences on teen decision

making. Students will use iPods and

internet surveys to answer questions about their moods, experiences, activities, friendships and their relationships with parents and friends. Students from 11 middle

schools in seven school districts in Oregon are participating. It is important to understand how social environments, moods and activities change over time for teenagers, so this project continues every year until students are in 11th grade.
