O. Please settle a wager I made with my daughter. The three arrows triangle symbol on the bottom of a product means it's recyclable, right? There's a pizza riding on your

A. Sorry, but it looks like you're buying pizza! This is a common misconception. The "chasing arrows" symbol frequently seen on products means the item could be recycled if there is collection for that item in a particular community, not necessarily in your community.

Which items are recyclable in the Florence area is specified by what your trash hauler, or what the transfer station, will accept for recycling. Be sure and read the newsletters and information from these service providers and follow their guidelines. If you have any questions, just ask; they are always happy to talk trash.

Florence currently has two trash haulers, both offer curbside recycling for commercial, residential and multi-family properties.

Whether products are recyclable in a given community is dictated by the market for the material and whether the cost of collection and transportation makes sense for the businesses

O. What does the number mean that is found inside the recycling symbol on plastic containers?

A. This is the base resin type of plastic used in that container. For example, milk jugs are often labeled 2 or HDPE (High Density Polyethylene). This labeling system was developed by the plastic industry to help recyclers identify different resin types. It's important to note that the number alone is not an indicator of whether the item is recyclable; how they form the resin changes the

Just like a glass bottle is recyclable but window glass is not, a No. 1 PETE bottle is recyclable but a #1 cookie tray is not. At least not in Florence, not yet!

Q. Can I recycle paper plates and paper towels? Paper is recyclable, correct?

A. Unfortunately, no. Paper products that are designed to stay strong

when wet-like cups, plates and towels, often have a chemical or plastic component that is damaging to the paper remaking process.

Also, paper products with food or grease residue are not recyclable. The better option? Choose durable dishes and reusable towels.

O. What about those funny boxes that juice and soy milk come in? They're not really paper, or plastic or foil. Do they just go in the trash?

A. We call those aseptic or shelfstable containers and, yes, they are recyclable at the Transfer Stationcheck with your trash hauler to make sure they accept them curbside. Aseptic containers commonly hold

juice, soup, rice milk and similar products. When empty just rinse and drain. By the way, the classic gable top milk cartons are also recyclable.

When the carton is empty just rinse

and allow to drain. If the carton is not allowed to dry out, the material just molds on its way to the paper mill and then is not recyclable.

The mission of the MR program is to bridge the gap between awareness and action by motivating people to reduce solid waste at home, work and play. SOS receives \$10,000 grant from Coquille Tribes

On Feb. 19, Siuslaw Outreach Services received a \$10,000 grant from the Coquille Tribal Community Fund in North Bend. This grant will supplement the SOS Emergency Voucher Fund, which is used for a broad array of emergency situations.

In 2014 nearly 1,000 vouchers were provided to persons who were senior, disabled, low-income or homeless, and who found themselves in some sort of emergency circum-

"This grant will help carry our fund through most of 2015, and we will need to use it carefully to make it last until we are able to secure other grants," said executive director David Wiegan.

Sixty-five grants, totaling \$408,000, were presented at the ceremony.
