Planned Parenthood of Southwestern Oregon (PP SO) has provided high quality sexual and reproductive health care and education to adults and young people.

Due to limited financial resources, PPSO has made the difficult decision to close its Florence Health Center.

The last day of service in Florence will be Tuesday. May 19.

The Florence Health Center opened in 2004. It has provided preventive health care to thousands of adults and young people.

Services at the Florence Health Center include birth control, annual exams, cervical and breast cancer screenings and sexually transmitted disease testing and treatment.

"We care about Florence and the families here, and are proud to have served the community for over a decade. It was a tough decision to close the center," says Cynthia Pappas, CEO. "Our work has been wel-

comed and supported by

For almost 50 years, many dedicated donors and community members and has made what we believe is a lasting, positive impact on the community."

Limited financial resources and reduced patient volume due to the aging demographic in Florence caused the PPSO Board of Directors to review the viability of the Florence Health Center.

The combination of health care provider shortages, changing patient needs, and new health care protocols have made maintaining the center cost prohibitive for the healthcare non-profit.

Patients can continue to get health care through Planned Parenthood at one of their other locations.

The West Eugene Health Center, 541-902-7861, is the closest facility, an hour's drive from Florence at 793 N. Danebo Ave.

Other local providers include Douglas County Health Center in Reedsport. 541-271-4835, and the McKenzie Primary Care Associates in Florence, 541-997-1251.
