Visitors reminded to be 'fire safe' in forests

CORVALLIS — With persistently warm and dry weather on the Oregon Coast this spring, Siuslaw National Forest officials have raised the Forest's fire danger level to "moderate" and are reminding visitors to be mindful of fire safety this summer.

"Although we're not as prone to wildfires as National Forests in arid regions, the Siuslaw National Forest does have a history of wildfires," said Dan Eddy, fire manage-

ment officer. "Steep slopes and thick layers of organic material on the ground can provide opportunities for wildfires to grow and spread quickly."

The majority of fires on the Siuslaw National Forest are human-caused, Eddy said.

"Of the 15 recorded incidents we had last year, 14 of them were determined to be human-caused," he said, citing escaped campfires as the leading cause.

No fire restrictions for the

public are in place, but visitors are asked to exercise caution when visiting natural areas:

1. Keep campfires small and in an area cleared down to mineral soil
2. Only burn materials that fit within the campfire ring
3. Be mindful of overhanging vegetation or limbs
4. Extinguish all campfires before leaving — even if gone for a short period of time
5. Smoke inside vehicles or in areas cleared at least four

square feet wide

Fireworks, including sparklers, are prohibited in National Forests.

All fires or unsafe use of fires by visitors should be reported to the Coastal Valley Interagency Dispatch Center at 541-750-7024 or by calling 911.

On the Bite

MID COAST LAKES
Fishing for the various warm water fish species can be productive during the spring as lake temperatures start to rise and fish begin spawning. Anglers will start finding more fish up in the shallows this time of year.

SIUSLAW RIVER: cutthroat trout
The cutthroat trout season is now open for the season. The main stem of the Siuslaw and Lake Creek can be good fishing as well as the larger tributaries entering these systems. Bait is not allowed above the head of tide but small spinners, spoons and fly fishing can be very productive.

ALSEA RIVER: Cutthroat trout

The cutthroat trout season is now open for the season and anglers should have fair to good results in most of the larger tributaries and mainstem. Small spinners are typically productive as wells as small spoons or fly fishing with nymphs or streamers.

SALMON RIVER: Cutthroat trout
Cutthroat trout are now open to harvest. Typically good fishing can be had during the early part of the season. Using small lures like spinners, spoons or various flies can be productive.

SILETZ RIVER: Steelhead

Summer steelhead fishing is slowly starting to pick up. New fish will continually be moving into the river over the next few months with the peak numbers typically in July. River flows are much lower than normal for this time of year so think small and subtle presentations. Typical steelhead tactics apply such as bobber and jig / bait, or casting spoons or spinners. Cutthroat trout are now also open to harvest and can be found throughout the main stem river and many large tributaries.

WILSON RIVER: steelhead, Chinook, cutthroat
Spring Chinook fishing is slow in the low clear water. A few more fish are showing in the river.

Summer steelhead angling is slow also. Angling for cutthroat trout should be fair. Use lighter gear for best results.

YAQUINA RIVER: cutthroat trout

The cutthroat trout season has opened and anglers can expect to have fair to good fishing. The mainstem Yaquina and Big Elk Creek are good places to try casting small spinners or spoons as well.
