Before the Rains Come

Book review by Lynda Green In Leaving Before the Rains Come, Alexandra "Bobo" Fuller of Africa continues her life story, writing this memoir from her newly adopted continent after she marries an American river guide.

Born in England and transported to Africa at the age of 3 by her adventurous, courageous, quirky, and resourceful parents, Fuller realizes at age 16 that if she ever severs her ties from the African continent "an essential part of [her] connection with this earth would become forever detached."

Yet she does sever that tie for what she mistakenly perceives as a safe bet for a settled life in the States with Charlie Ross, far from the uncertainty of her life in Africa.

She thinks her new spouse, Charlie, "has perfected the art of knowing how to live" even though her father has cautioned her that "most people...want to be alive for as long as possible without having any idea whatsoever how to live."

In this touching telling of life on a new continent Fuller, now a married mother of two, shares her most intimate moments and self-realizations through her emotionally piercing prose and

her heartfelt humor. If you have yet to meet Fuller, first read her Don't Let's Go to the Dogs Tonight, to experience the dangers of her childhood, threats from the land, the outbreak of civil war, and the resulting political change.

Then, pick up this latest memoir, guaranteed to touch your heart, evoke tears, and perhaps make you feel a bit homesick for severed ties.

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
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
