The USCG and Auxiliary, the Port of Siuslaw and Siuslaw Valley Fire and Rescue join boating professionals and boating enthusiasts to heighten awareness of different life jacket types that are available, including inflatable life jackets, and demonstrate their comfort and versatility by wearing them

The annual event, hosted by the National Safe Boating Council (NSBC), serves as a fun educational element just prior to National Safe Boating Week, May 21-27, the official launch of the 2016 North American Safe Boating Campaign.

Educating the boating public about the safety and comfort of life jackets has been a main focus of the NSBC.

U.S. Coast Guard statistics show that drowning was the reported cause of death in approximately 78 percent of recreational boating fatalities in 2014, and approximately 84 percent of those who drowned were not wearing life jackets.

Operator inattention, improper lookout, operator inexperience, excessive speed, and alcohol use rank as the top five primary contributing factors in accidents.

Station Siuslaw River Senior Chief Tregoning said, "Time and time again, the wearing of life jackets proves to significantly increase chance of survival and detection when the unthinkable happens. With the many variables that can affect the outcome of a voyage, life jackets are cheap insurance to help mariners return to their loved ones after a day on the water."

The U.S. Coast Guard Station Siuslaw River encourages others including members of the boating public, community leaders, and those interested in showing the wearability of life jackets to participate in "Wear Your Life Jacket to Work" on May 20.

weedeaters, rakes, pruners and other tools, the group went to work cleaning up the historic spot. The project is the the first phase of what is envisioned to take at least three more trips to get the cemetery in good shape.

Haring Pioneer Cemetery was established on the Amos Haring Farm in 1890.

Previously, two of the Herrings' young children, Benny, who died in 1890 at age 7, and Rachel, who died in 1883 at age 19 months, had been buried in bottomland that frequently flooded.

Amos then moved the children's remains to the newly sited cemetery.
