Positions held by Mayor Joe Henry and councilors Joshua Greene and Ron Preisler will be up for reelection. All three plan to run for their current positions again.

Any qualified elector who is registered to vote in the City of Florence and has resided in the city since Nov. 8, 2015, is eligible to run for the two four-year councilor positions and the mayor's two-year position.

The city council is the governing body of the city. It is responsible for passing laws, fees, policies and the annual budget. It also develops the overall vision for the city.

The mayor has no additional executive functions aside from his or her position on the council. However, the mayor facilitates the council and presides over deliberations, determines order of business, appoints positions to boards and committees and performs ceremonial functions.

Weese encourages qualified citizens to run for an office. She is available by appointment to meet with people to give more information and to go over requirements.

Everyone is welcome and encouraged to participate. Stevens will attend and dis-


and will answer any questions.


