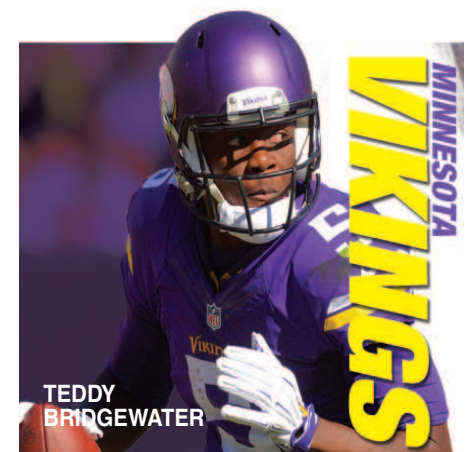


AARON RODGERS

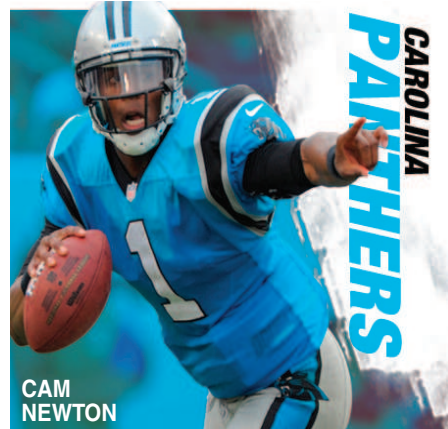

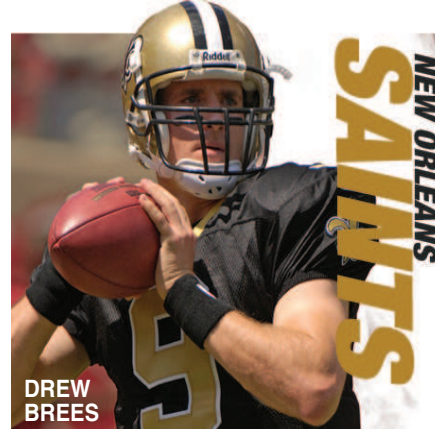
