PTA holds Every Student Succeeds Act community forum

The public is invited to a community forum hosted by the Florence Community PTA and sponsored by Oregon State PTA, covering the topic of ESSA (Every Student Succeeds Act).

This relatively new legislation, signed into law on Dec. 10, 2015, reforms the 50-year-old ESEA (Elementary and Secondary Education Act) and replaces the No Child Left Behind Act of 2002.

ESSA focuses on a goal of preparing all students throughout K-12 grades for success in college and careers.

What does ESSA mean in Oregon? The forum will focus on this question, with an emphasis on assessments.

Focus will be on how ESSA is to be implemented in Oregon, and what it means for local school districts.

Speakers include representatives from the Oregon Department of Education, the Oregon Education Association and Oregon PTA's President, Collin Robinson.

A panel discussion is planned, with time for questions from attendees.

Local PTA unit leaders

from around the region will be attending a leadership training during the morning hours that day, including a networking lunch at noon.

Afternoon forum attendees are welcome to attend the lunch as well.
