As a city, we plan for emergencies varying from the typical storms to the Cascadia earthquake and resulting tsunami. Our crews are constantly monitoring the status of our infrastructure in order to maintain high service levels for our citizens.

The City of Florence is a founding member of the West Lane **Emergency Operations Group** (WLEOG), which coordinates regional emergency management, preparedness, education, and response. This group was formed from the need to coordinate emergency preparation and response efforts in the wake of a Cascadia event. Planning for the catastrophic event allows our agencies to work

together and coordinate efforts, which results in our ability to respond efficiently and effectively to the more frequent and smaller

Both the City of Florence and our WLEOG partner agencies encourage citizens to prepare themselves and their families for emergency situations.

Emergency Preparedness is essential for individuals and families. You and your family need to take the proper measures to be prepared in case of a natural disaster. Mother Nature can be very unpredictable and, if you are prepared and have the proper supplies on hand, then it will help eliminate some of the stress while you are trying to recuperate from an emergency situation.
