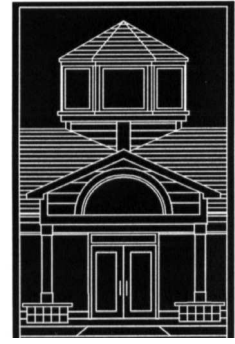

The Family Gene

"The Family Gene: A Mission to Turn My Deadly Inheritance into a Hopeful Future" by Joselin Linder is a gripping medical mystery that opens a window onto the exploding field of genomic medicine.

When Linder was in her 20s, her legs suddenly started to swell. After years of misdiagnoses, doctors discovered a deadly blockage in her liver.

Struggling to find an explanation for her unusual condition, Linder compared the medical chart of her father — who had died from a mysterious illness 10 years prior — with that of an uncle who had died under similarly strange circumstances.

Delving further into the past, she discovered that her grandmother had displayed symptoms similar to hers before her death.

Clearly, Linder's illness was more than a fluke.

Setting out to build a more complete picture of the sickness that haunted her family, Linder approached Dr. Christine Seidman, the head of a group of world-class genetic researchers at Harvard Medical School, for help.

Dr. Seidman had been working on her family's case for 20 years

and had finally confirmed that 14 of Linder's relatives carried something called a "private mutation" — meaning that they were the first known people to experience the baffling symptoms of a brand new genetic variant.

Here, Linder tells the story of their gene: the lives it claimed and the lives that advances in genomic medicine still have a potential to save.

Digging into family records and medical history, conducting interviews with relatives and friends, and reflecting on her own experiences with Dr. Seidman, Linder pieces together the lineage of this deadly gene to write a gripping and unforgettable exploration of family, history and love.

A compelling chronicle of survival and perseverance, "The Family Gene" is an important story of a young woman reckoning with her father's death, her own mortality and her ethical obligations to herself and those closest to her.

Annual backpack giveaway Sunday

Earlier this year, TCC donated supply packs to more than 5,610 teachers across the U.S. and 3,000 care kits to senior living communities.








SVFR RESPONDS TO CRITICAL CALL ON DUNES

On Sunday, July 16, Siuslaw Valley Fire and Rescue, along with Western Lane Ambulance, responded to reports of a male found unconscious on the Oregon dunes near the Goose Pasture staging area. Upon arrival, first responders deter-

mined that the patient was in critical condition and required air medical transport to Sacred Heart — Riverbend Hospital in Springfield.

As WLAD attended and treated the patient, SVFR responders set up a landing

zone for REACH air medical on South Jetty Road. The patient was successfully transferred to the helicopter in critical condition. The circumstances of the incident are currently under investigation by Lane County Sheriffs.
