

NEWPORT AQUARIUM INVITES PUBLIC TO ‘SEAS THE DAY’ AT WORLD OCEANS EVENT JUNE 30

NEWPORT — The Oregon Coast Aquarium will celebrate World Oceans Day on Saturday, June 30. The event highlights the importance of the ocean and its inhabitants through interactive activities, raffles, and animal presentations.

The theme for 2018 World Oceans Day is “Our Oceans, Our Future.”

The goal is to call attention to the ocean’s inextricable link to the well-being of the planet, and how reducing plastic consumption benefits the world’s largest ecosystem — from plankton to people.

The event will encourage guests to take part in everyday solutions to plastic pollution and marine litter.

Learn from Max the sea lion

and Schuster the sea otter as they show their commitment to recycling by disposing of plastic bottles in the proper receptacle.

Presentations starring JoJo the brown pelican will educate guests on the importance of proper waste disposal so that plastics and fishing line don’t endanger seabirds.

Visitors can also chat with the marine mammal team about the aquarium’s entanglement rehabilitation cases, like the northern fur seal pup.

Don’t miss the once in a lifetime opportunity to see the dissection of a blue shark that was caught as bycatch.

To illustrate the concept of reducing plastic consumption, visitors are encouraged to take

the Better Bag Challenge by pledging to avoid disposable bags for at least one year.

Pledgers will receive a free aquarium tote bag sporting the slogan, “This Bag Saves Sea Turtles”.

The annual World Oceans Day event is celebrated by organizations across the globe to promote understanding and stewardship of the ocean.

The aquarium will be hosting the Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife, NOAA Marine Operations (Pacific), USFS Cape Perpetua, Depoe Bay Whale Center with Oregon State Parks, Whale and Dolphin Conservation, and the American Cetacean Society.

Each organization will engage visitors with displays

and activities that inspire ocean conservation.

“World Oceans Day is a great opportunity to celebrate and honor the blue planet that we all depend on,” said Jeff Harms, Education Manager at the Oregon Coast Aquarium.

“The aquarium hopes to inspire visitors to appreciate our ocean and to take action in helping to keep it healthy. Working together, we can and will protect the ocean that connects us all.”

World Oceans Day activities are free with aquarium admission and advance registration is not required.

GEMWALKERS TO TAKE SALISHAN SPIT SUMMER STROLL

The Yachats Coastal Gems walking group invites interested walkers to join them Saturday, June 30, in Gleneden, Ore., for a family fun walk.

This walk explores the town and beach of Gleneden, with a leisure stroll out the Salishan Spit. The group will have challenges, contests and prizes.

Follow signs to Gleneden

Beach State Park Wayside, just south of Lincoln City, and meet in the picnic shelter of Gleneden Beach State Park Wayside on Wesler Street.

Parking is available both at the park and on the street.

Register for and start the walk between 8 a.m. and noon, and the walks finish by 3 p.m.

A guided three-mile walk will

start at 10 a.m.

For those doing the long walk out the Salishan Spit, an early start is suggested.

Dogs are allowed but must be on a 6-foot leash (not retractable) and owners must carry and use appropriate cleanup materials.

The 3-, 6- and 13-mile walks are fairly level. However, due to

sand, none of the walks are suitable for strollers or wheelchairs.

Bring sun screen, a hat, sunglasses and a towel in case you decide to dip your toes in the ocean.

Spring Chinook ain’t over yet

Anglers are still finding fair to good fishing for spring Chinook from the Oregon Coast to the northeast corner of the state. Check out reports for the Siletz, Rogue, Clackamas, North Fork and Santiam rivers.

SIUSLAW RIVER:
Cutthroat trout

Trout fishing in streams and river open on May 22. Fishing is restricted to artificial flies and lures, May 22- Aug 31.

MID-COAST LAKES:

Siltcoos Lagoon will not be stocked this year due to continued low dissolved oxygen. Trout scheduled to be released in Siltcoos Lagoon will be diverted to Cleawox Lake.

ALSEA RIVER: *Cutthroat trout*

Trout fishing in streams and river opened May 22. Fishing is restricted to artificial flies and lures through Aug 31.

SALMON RIVER:
Cutthroat trout

Trout fishing in streams and river opened May 22. Fishing is restricted to artificial flies and lures through Aug 31.

SILETZ RIVER: *Steelhead, spring Chinook, cutthroat trout*

Summer steelhead are in the river. Fishing is slow but will improve over the coming weeks. The river is in good condition. Casting spinners, drifting bait or using a bobber and jig can be effective.

Spring Chinook are available in the Siletz. Be aware of the regulations for the Siletz, 1 wild Chinook per day and two for the season now through July 31.

Trout fishing in streams and river opened May 22.

Note: The 3.5 mile bridge

(aka Steel Bridge in the Siletz gorge is now open to motorized vehicles, but is only open to public vehicles on the weekend. Anglers can walk/bike in the road during the weekdays. If anglers do walk in they can park at the one mile gate and start from there.

WILSON RIVER:
Steelhead, spring Chinook, trout

Summer steelhead are starting to show up on the Wilson River, and the run will continue to improve over the next month or more. Low clear water can make fishing for summer steelhead challenging, but there can be some good action. Drift fishing, spinners, and flies are good choices. Light line, small presentations, and fishing the riffles and deep pools at first and last light can increase success.

There are still a few spring Chinook available in the Wilson River, although numbers will be low. Bobber and eggs or sand shrimp, drift fishing, back bouncing, and divers and bait are all good techniques for springers; these fish can be finicky but are worth the effort!

Most of the rivers are restricted to artificial lures and flies above tidewater until Aug. 31, so check the regulations before you go.

YAQUINA RIVER:
Cutthroat trout

Trout fishing in streams and river opened May 22. Fishing is restricted to artificial flies and lures through Aug 31.

COOS RIVER BASIN:
Dungeness crab, bay clams, rockfish, trout

Streams and rivers opened to trout fishing May 22. Anglers can only use artificial flies and lures in streams above tidewater. The daily limit for trout in streams is 2 fish per day and they must be 8-inches

or longer.

Recreational fishing for bottomfish is open in the ocean along with bays and estuaries. The daily bag limit will be 5 marine fish plus 2 lingcod.

There will be no retention of cabezon until July 1. Anglers have reported catching rockfish, greenling and striped surfperch inside Coos Bay near the north jetty and other submerged rock structures.

Crabbing and clamming updates can now be found in the Crabbing and Clamming section of the Recreation Report.

TENMILE CREEK: *Trout, steelhead*

Streams and rivers opened to trout fishing May 22. Anglers can use only artificial flies and lures in streams above tidewater. The daily limit for trout in streams is 2 fish per day and they must be 8-inches or longer.

TENMILE LAKES: *Trout, warmwater species, largemouth bass*

Legal-size rainbow trout are scheduled to be stocked in Tenmile Lakes this week. Trout anglers trolling spinners and wedding rings in the main part of the lake are still catching holdover hatchery rainbow trout in Tenmile Lakes.

As water temperatures warm, trout fishing will be best in the early mornings. Trout fishing is open all year in Tenmile Lakes.

Fishing for largemouth bass is picking up with the warm, sunny days. Water temperatures are in the low-60s and bass will become very active in shallow water near weed lines and submerged logs.

Located ten miles north of North Bend alongside Highway 101, at the town of Lakeside. County Park with camping, boat ramp and a fishing dock.
