When you need to catch enough fish to make money for your family for the year, being close is not good enough; when you need to score the winning basket and you only get it close, you still lose.

By comparison, the sport of horseshoe pitching gives you points for being close. If you watch any war movies, then you already know about getting close with a hand grenade.

I know from playing horseshoes with my Dad and uncles that getting a "ringer" (when you get the

horseshoe around the metal stake) counts for 3 points. That's unless your opponent also gets a ringer, in which case it will cancel out your score.

Yet if your next shoe is close enough to the stake and closer than your opponent, then you get 1 point. So, at least in horseshoes, close does count.

I have seen very few horseshoe pits in my 40-plus years in Florence. The shoes tossed weigh close to two pounds. The stakes are 48 feet in distance. Given the distance the metal shoes need to be thrown, it's not a safe game to play around small children.

In fact, most young children

would be unable to toss the shoe the distance.

An alternative to this is the game of cornhole, which resembles horseshoes in terms of layout.

Two boards are placed 27 feet from base to base. The board is slightly angled, and a hole is located 6 inches from the top. The object is to toss a corn-filled bag into the hole to score 3 points.

Each player alternates throws with their opponent. Bags landing and staying on the board earn 1 point.

Because the distance is shorter and there are no horseshoes involved, it's a game that is much safer than tossing horseshoes and can be played by all ages. You can have slight modifications on the distance thrown to accommodate young players.

If you see me wearing a Raiders jersey or a Lakers jersey, for one day only, it is because I lost two games to my son-in-law. The next day, my grandson came to play cornhole against "Bubba" (the term of endearment my grandchildren call me.)

I marked 13-and a-half feet for his toss line, keeping in mind he is only 5 years old and feeling I needed to make it a fair concession to his young age.

I thought wrong.

He won the first game, 21-4. After he beat me a second time, I moved myself to his toss point.

Though I had a commanding 16-4 lead when I moved back to full distance, I went on to become a victim to his rally, losing to him 21-20

He then beat his "Auntie-A," coming from behind 17-4 to win 21-19.

It was clearly a good day for him.

I did beat one of my daughters to maintain at least some degree of respect; however, I must admit that, even though she was 38 weeks pregnant at the time, I showed her no mercy.

The variation of horseshoes to cornhole has fostered a new generation of activity. How big is the cornhole revelation? ESPN recently telecast the United States corn-



Spring Chinook are available in the Siletz. Be aware of the regulations for the Siletz, 1 wild Chinook per day and two for the season through July 31.

(aka Steel Bridge) in the Siletz gorge is now open to motorized vehicles, but is only open to public vehicles on the weekend.

Anglers can walk/bike in the road during the weekdays. If anglers do walk in they can park at the one mile gate and start from there.

Steelhead, spring Chinook, trout Summer steelhead are present in decent numbers. Low clear water can make fishing for summer steelhead challenging, but there can be some good action at first and last light, or on those drizzly overcast days. Concentrate on deep pools and deeper riffles. Drift fishing, spinners, and flies are good choices. Light line, small presentations, and fishing the riffles and deep pools at first and last light can increase success.

There are still a few spring Chinook available in the Wilson River, although numbers will be very low, especially considering the low runs we are seeing on other basins.

Cutthroat trout can be found throughout the river, with searuns beginning to enter tidal areas. Fishing should be fair to good, with spinners or flies good bets for success.
