Enforcement of Oregon's new tobacco sales law, which raised the age for a person to buy tobacco products from 18 to 21, began Jan. 1, 2018.

"Selling tobacco to people effect that raised the minimum under 21 years old is illegal, but these data show that nearly one out of every five tobacco retailers in Oregon still sells to people under the legal age," said Tom Jeanne, MD, deputy state health officer at the OHA The Public Health Division, Public Health Division. "Tobacco remains the number one preventable cause of death and bacco retailers across Oregon to disability and kills nearly 8,000 people in Oregon each year."

was the fifth state to raise the legal age to purchase tobacco products to 21.

Retailer owners that sell tobacco to underage persons face up to a \$500 fine for the first or second violation and up to \$1,000 for three or more viola-

For the first time, the OHA Public Health Division has taken the added step of publicizing the list of tobacco retailers that violated the tobacco sales law.
