Three of the match's four sets were won in extra play and by just two points, with Siuslaw's 25-19 win in the third set being the largest margin of victory. "We had tough serving and a really balanced offense that I don't think Marist was expecting," said Hornung, whose team had four players — seniors Makenzie York and Alyssa Richards, and juniors Mia

Collins and Elissa Hurley — all score at least 8 kills each. York had the lion's share, smacking 12 kills and delivering 7 aces over the net. Collins contributed 9 kills, along with 8 kills each from Richards and Hurley. After narrowly losing the first set 28-26, Siuslaw came out strong in the second set to even the match at 1-1 with a 27-25 win. That momentum carried into the third set for the decisive 25-19 win that gave Siu-

slaw the advantage — and an opportunity to take the match in four sets. "We all got together before the fourth game and said, 'We can do this,'" said senior Falon Borgnino, who had four blocks in the match. A major turning point game late in the fourth set, when the game was delayed while officials debated over a hit. A call against Siuslaw would have given Marist a 26-24 win to force a fifth game.

Instead, the point went to the Vikings, who responded by quickly tying the set at 25-25 on a thunderous kill by Collins between two Marist defenders. "Was I smiling when I hit that shot?" Collins replied afterward when asked what she was thinking when she delivered the game-tying spike. When told it was more of a smirk, she laughed. "That sounds right. We worked really hard to keep focused and keep each other up. I think this win should give

us some real confidence." York went on to finish out the match from the service line as the Viks won it on a Marist hitting error, 27-25. In addition to its balanced and aggressive offense, Siuslaw also got tremendous defense led by the efforts of Richards, with 10 digs, Collins with 9 digs, and freshmen Hayden Muller and Zoe Alberty, who had 9 digs and 5 digs, respectively. To reach the play-offs, Siuslaw needs to be ranked among

the top 20 by the Oregon School Activities Association (OSAA). After Thursday's upset, the Vikings improved from No. 22 to No. 21, with games against Marshfield (Oct. 9), Elmira (Oct. 11) and Junction City (Oct. 16) remaining. Next Thursday's home game against Elmira will be Senior Night, when the Viks will recognize seniors Borgnino, York and Richards. First serve for all three matches is set for 6:30 p.m.
