Dunes City seeks to fill budget committee vacancies

Dunes City is looking for volunteers to fill four vacancies on the city's Budget Committee. Dunes City is accepting applications for two vacancies with a term ending date of June 30, 2019, one vacancy with a term ending date of June 30, 2020, and one vacancy with a term ending date of June 30, 2021.

All applicants must be Dunes City residents. The Budget Committee meets a few times in the spring to review and, if necessary, revise the proposed budget fiscal year before it is formally adopted by the Dunes City Council. The Committee also meets quarterly to review budgeted and actual expenditures and revenue.

Passing lane construction begins Monday near Walton

WALTON - Travelers should expect 20-minute delays along Highway 126, the Florence-Eugene Highway west of Walton, as crews begin work to add a westbound passing lane between Walker Creek and Chickahominy Creek.

Tree falling will begin next week, starting Monday, Feb. 4, and will require traffic be stopped and flagged through the area for safety.

Delays should be expected Monday through Thursday between 7:30 a.m. and 6 p.m. Crews will work at times on Friday mornings between 8 a.m. and noon. There will be no lane closures or flagging at night or on weekends.

Centerline and shoulder rumble strips will be added.

The \$5 million project will also replace a large culvert pipe under the highway with a box culvert, and include environmental mitigation for environmental impacts and water quality treatment.

The entire project is scheduled to be completed by the end of September 2019.

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Law enforcement agencies to focus on seatbelt usage Feb. 4-17

SALEM – A simple click, or a few minutes putting a child passenger in the right safety seat system, could save the cost of a ticket.

More importantly, it could save a life.

Law enforcement officials will be out all across Oregon to help ensure that happens Feb. 4 to 17 in an overtime campaign using funds from Oregon Department of Transportation (ODOT).

“We have Oregon State Police, 48 police departments and 19 sheriff's offices participating in this campaign,” said Kelly Mason, program manager. “That kind of participation shows just how important it is to buckle up everyone, every trip.”

In 2016 in Oregon, lack of a safety belt or child restraint system was a factor in 89 deaths — or 26 percent of the 343 motor vehicle occupant fatalities.

That same year, 1,992 children under 12 were injured in crashes, and 10 percent of those were reported not using a child passenger restraint system.

Oregon law requires children to ride in a rear-facing safety seat until they are at least two years old.

A child over age two must continue to ride in a car seat with harness until 40 pounds and then in a booster until they reach age eight or 4' 9" in height and the adult belt fits them correctly.

Across the country, motor vehicle crashes are the leading cause of death for children ages 1 to 12 years old. Studies show that child car seats may increase crash survival by 71 percent for infants under 1 year old and by up to 59 percent for toddlers ages 1 to 4.

ODOT, law enforcement

and safety advocates encourage all users of the transportation system to take personal responsibility for being safe. Take time to use child safety seats correctly (see your manufacturer's guidebook, or visit oregonimpact.org/Car-Seat-Resources.htm for a safety seat check station).
