

Huntington's report also showed the costs associated with the approval of the project by the city, which could impact the final cost of the effort to upgrade the sites. These costs were unclear at this time, but Huntington will clarify the city costs associated with the site upgrade and provide an up-

date to the commissioners. The overall response from commissioners to Huntington's proposal was positive, as the figures provided by the port manager supported the fiscal benefits to enacting the upgrade.

"Based on these numbers, we can finance this ourselves," said Commissioner Mike Buckwald. "And if these are the numbers, that's an increase of \$91,000 a year for a cost of approximately \$140,000, I'm not sure you can go wrong with that."

Commissioners expressed concerns regarding the timing and the manner in which the renovation should take place. Through the discussion, the majority felt the work should be done this season if possible, but certainly by next year as the budgeting process is beginning for the next fiscal cycle.

There was no final determination made regarding the implementation of Huntington's proposal, but the commissioners gave direction to finalize his proposal, including the updated installation and permitting costs from the city, to present at the next commissioners meeting.
