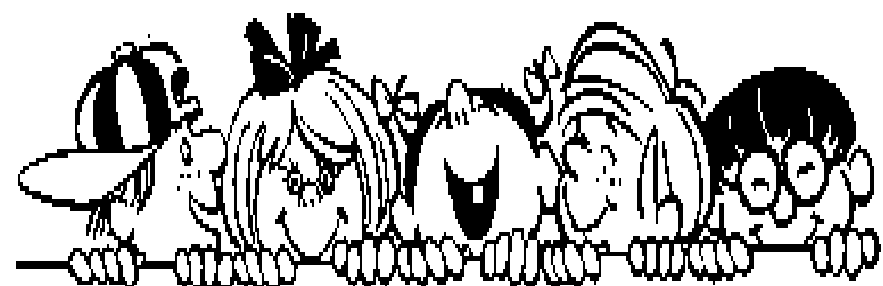
Lane County Head Start

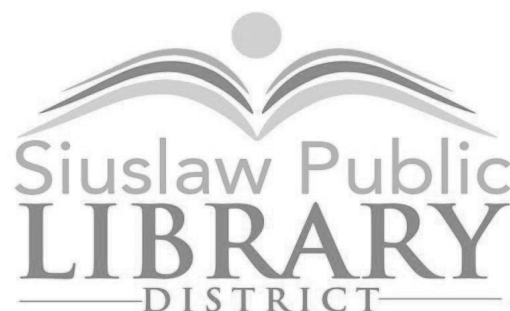
Vision/hearing/dental screenings and
