


"Thanksgiving and Christmas are really close together this year. So, for the traditionalists who say you can't have Christmas until after Thanksgiving, we had to work around that," said Chamber Event Coordinator Mitzi Hathaway.

The solution is to have the

"Shop Small' is big," Hathaway said. "On Saturday, we need everyone to come out. It's so important to keep the money in our town. ... By supporting our businesses, that money stays here."

The special holiday snack trail will encourage people to shop local businesses and restaurants while getting treats in Old Town, uptown, off Rhododendron Drive and all the way south to Darlings Marina. This trail will run during each business's regular hours, and the chamber will provide a map.

"That's the great thing about the chamber," Hathaway noted. "Being a chamber business means exposure. We advertise, we do these events and we do them for the community — but we also do them to get our businesses known."

Starting today is the Sea Lion on a Shelf, sponsored

by Sea Lion Caves, another new event. With 35 locations, this passport will guide people on a free adventure to spot "Sammy the Sea Lion" through Dec. 20. Once a person finds at least 15 of the possible 35 stuffed sea lions hidden at various locations, they are entered into a drawing to win \$100, \$50 or \$25 at one of the participating businesses. Hathaway said this

brings a Florence flavor to the popular "Elf on a Shelf" book and photo challenge.

"Sammy has already made his way around social media," she said. "We've had calls last week with people already wanting to find Sammy."

Passports are available now at Florence Visitor's Center, 290 Highway 101; Siuslaw News, 148 Maple St.; and BeauxArts Fine Art Materials and Gallery, 2285 Highway 101.

"We want people to use the hashtag 'SeaLionOn-AShelf, 'ShopSmallFlorence' and 'CocoaCookie&Cider-Trail," Hathaway said. "The community is excited, the merchants are excited and we're excited for all these events."

Also visible around town starting this week are the chamber's custom snowflakes, which were refurbished earlier this year and now sport a fresh powder coating and lights. These were installed on Monday thanks to the efforts of Florence Public Works and Central Lincoln PUD.

Additional decorations from both the chamber and the City of Florence will go up once the weather calms.

'There are two trees in Old Town, the traditional tree, that the mayor will light on Dec. 7, and the gazebo tree. And I get to decorate the gazebo tree," Hathaway said. "This tree is for the kids. It's a whimsical, Santa Claus, candy land, Santa's workshop type of tree. ... For those walking by on Bay Street, it's going to glimmer and it's going to shine."

She said the tree would be up by the end of Thanksgiving Day and would encompass many of the season's holidays, from Yule, Winter Solstice, Christmas, Hanukkah, Kwanzaa and the New Year.

The following Saturday is the traditional Florence Holiday Festival and Tree Lighting from 3:30 to 7 p.m. The community is invited to Historic Old Town Florence for the annual festival to enjoy live entertainment, warm beverages, great holiday season sales, hayrides, caroling and the Mayor's Tree Lighting Celebration at 5:30 p.m.

"Santa has agreed to be here and he's coming in on the fire truck," Hathaway said. "And we moved the tice for juggling three festive tree lighting to be a little earlier. This gives people time to stay for the tree lighting and go up to the Florence Events Center for Holly Jolly Follies. You could park in the middle and go to both make a night of it."

Florence Events Center, 715 Quince St., will also be hosting the free Empty Bowls fundraiser for Florence Food Share from Dec. 6 to 8 and Florence Regional Arts Alliances' Holiday Arts Festival on Dec. 7 and 8. More information is available at eventcenter.org.

One new aspect Hathaway is bringing to the Holiday Festival this year will be the spirit of giving. People will be encouraged to bring one or two food donations of the Florence Food Share's most-needed items to collection spots included in the festivities.

"We're hoping to fill in gaps left after the Pounding, after Thanksgiving, when all that food is distributed," Hathaway said. "We hope the food share can take inventory and let us know exactly what they need. That's where the chamber and this event are going to come in let's fill those gaps, be it for formula, peanut butter or whatever they need to get through the entire holiday season and beyond."

Hathaway has lived in Florence since March and been with the chamber since the fall. She has worked on many events since starting, which have been good pracevents at once.

"We are really gearing our events right now around the magic of the holiday season through the eyes of kids," Hathaway said. "It's all about having fun and bringing families together. And none of our events cost. The tree lighting is free, the hayrides are free, seeing Santa is free, the Sea Lion on a Shelf is free. Everything is free.
