## Oregon families to begin receiving \$134 million in extra SNAP benefits

On May 5, the Department of Human Services (DHS) and the Oregon Department of Education (ODE) announced that more than 351,000 students receiving free Oregon meals from schools will get additional food benefits for groceries during the school closure.
