Jackpot hits at Three Rivers in Florence n July 24, Three Rivers Casino Resort, 5647 Highway 126 in Florence, was the site of a \$36,376 jackpot - a bright spot in the midst of

COVID-19. The big winner, Sheldon P., hit the big one at about 11:30 p.m. He had driven over to the coast with his wife to

beat the heat in Eugene. Sheldon had been playing for a few hours and was down to about \$20 when he decided to try his luck at the Tarzan slot machine. On his second pull, he hit the Progressive "Grand" jackpot for \$36,276.00.

"We love to see our guests hit these big jackpots, it's really exciting for everyone," said Rich Colton, Three Rivers Casino Marketing Director. "And we have had almost 10 jackpots like this throughout the years."
