true for at-risk youth, as socialization takes place primarily as we grow up, and is built on trust and support from parents and other involved adults.

Twenty-three days after celebrating his 18th birthday on March 6, Adam chose death by suicide by using a gun stored at his home. His younger brother and sister were home at the time of his death, both of whom are still trying to come to grips with the tragedy.

Jaime believes the lack of contact with peers and role models, in addition to the constant physical threats and abuse he witnessed growing up, changed the caring boy she knew into a troubled and — at times angry young man.

"Adam chose the wrong path more than once. But

Florence, he was working on his anger management issues and he was clean," Jaime said. "He wasn't using drugs and he was trying to finish school as soon as possible because he — and all my children - missed a year when they were taken by their father."

Her memories of the final few hours of Adam's life were naturally painful for her to relate, but Jaime said she is able to glean at least some measure of peace from her last words with her son, which were positive and
