Voters who do not receive a ballot for the May 18, 2021 Special Election can check on the status of their registration and ballot at www.oregonvotes. gov. They may also contact Lane County Elections at 541-682-4234 to determine if they need to update their voter registration in order

Voters may drop off their ballots at one of many official drop box locations listed in the insert included with their ballot.

Drop boxes are now open and will remain open until 8 p.m. on Election Day.

Due to COVID-19, the Lane County Elections Office will be open to the public only on Friday, May 14; Monday, May 17; and Tuesday, May 18, Election Day.

Add yard trimmings directly into your brown cart. Make sure it all fits with the lid closed. Keep it closed at all times! Put your cart out by the curb weekly on trash day, even if it isn't full.
