A baby boy, Scott, was adopted in 1967. After experiencing such a positive adoptive experience, she was an inspired volunteer for Children's Home Society for over two decades,

committed to supporting this organization that cares for parents and children through the adoption process.

A consummate homemaker in the best sense of the word, not only did she make a home and dedicate her life to her family, she did it with gusto and artistry. She thoroughly enjoyed entertaining, gaving great dinner parties and fun, large events her whole life.

A marvelous cook and baker, you were lucky to have tasted her delicious lasagna or famous brownies.

Evelyn had a spark in her eye and a wit to her tongue up through her last days, and she is remembered for her robust laugh. Quick to speak her mind, she wasn't one to hold back and didn't suffer fools lightly.

She was known as "E.A.",

"Mary Agnes", "Louise", "Nippy" and specially "George" by her adoring husband Owen, who had a penchant for nicknames.

They had called each other "George" since high school; she was "Lil George" to his "Big George."

Nature was a passion for her. There wasn't an animal that didn't love her, as she did them. Nor was there a plant that she couldn't grow, always growing masses of flowers and surrounding their family homes with an artistic landscape.

An avid bird watcher her whole life, she could identify all kinds and delighted in tracking them outside her windows and on their many travels.

When Owen retired in 1991, Evelyn and he moved to Florence, Ore. There, they built a beautiful home

as some of the first residents in Florentine Estates, cultivating a warm circle of friends in the neighborhood and surrounding community.

Evelyn took to her new hometown with zest, joining the Florentine Bridge Club and supporting the neighborhood in many ways. Taking pleasure in the gardens around town, she became an active member of the Florence Garden Club, finding much joy in the many friendships she made there and propagating countless plant starts for their infamous plant sale.

Owen and Evelyn sold their treasured home in Florence in 2019, relocating to Portland, Ore., to live with their daughter Cher and her husband Ric Levendosky, and to be near grandchildren Yara and Aram and their spouses Julio and Mattie, along with great-grandchildren Omar, Lucia, and Vera.

Oregon approved to issue more than \$550 million in SNAP food assistance for children

SALEM — The State of Oregon received approval from the federal government to issue Pandem-ic EBT (P-EBT) for the 2020-21 school year. This will provide more than \$550 million in food assistance for approximately 572,000 children in Oregon.

P-EBT provides food benefits to families whose children do not have access to the free or reduced-price meals usually provided at school. Oregon was approved to provide retroactive food benefits to eligible students for the 2020-21 school year.

The P-EBT benefits are expected to be issued beginning in July.

ODHS and ODE share

responsibility in ensuring that children across Oregon receive P-EBT food benefits. ODE collaborates with school districts across Oregon to determine eligibility and ODHS issues the benefits on Electronic Benefit Transfer (EBT) cards.

Households do not need to apply for P-EBT. Benefits will be automatically issued for students who normally have access to free and reduced-price meals and are enrolled at a school in Oregon.

If your children are not currently enrolled in free or reduced meals you can apply through your school or online at the Oregon Department of Education website. Qualifying for free or

reduced meals for the 2020school year before June 21 30 will ensure you receive P-EBT when the benefits are issued. P-EBT benefit eligibility and amounts will vary. Visit pebt.oregon.gov for more information.


dents and households new to P-EBT and households with more than one student will receive an Oregon P-EBT card in the mail with in-structions. Cards will be mailed to the address on file with the school for those students who do not receive SNAP.

Students who are already receiving Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) benefits will receive the P-EBT benefits on the EBT card associated with household's SNAP their case.
