Razor clam harvesting open on central Oregon coast

On June 11, the Oregon Department of Agriculture (ODA) and the Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife (ODFW) announce the opening of all razor clam harvesting on the central Oregon coast.

Razor clamming is now open from Cape Lookout (just south of Netarts Bay) south to

the California border. Recent shellfish samples taken from this area indicate levels of the marine biotoxin domoic acid have fallen below the alert level.

The closure threshold for domoic acid in razor clams is 20 ppm (parts per million). Clatsop beach samples were 33 ppm.

Other razor clam harvest areas include beaches in Gold Beach, Bandon and Winchester Bay, among others.

Mussel, bay clam and crab harvesting remain open along the entire Oregon coast. Coastal scallops are not affected by biotoxin closures when only the adductor muscle is eaten. ODA does not recom-

mend eating whole scallops. Commercial shellfish products remain safe for consumers.

Paralytic shellfish toxin and domoic acid toxin are produced by algae and originate in the ocean. ODA will continue to test for shellfish toxins twice per month, as tides and weather permit.

Director John Barnett, who could only attend for the first part of the meeting, said, "It's just absolutely amazing the contributions that Suzanne and Paul have brought over the years."

He then read letters from Siuslaw staff members who have worked with Mann-Heintz and Burns, acknowledging their dedication to the students of the district and their education — both in- and outside the classroom.

Barnett also thanked them on behalf of the board, citing Mann-Heintz' diplomacy and Burns' leadership, as well as other qualities.

"You know, as board members, we've all had differences of opinions, but we've all been able to work through them," Barnett said.

Later in the meeting, the outgoing directors got the chance to speak.

"I just felt so honored to be a part of this district, and to be a part of this board," Mann-Heintz said. "You know, after teaching for 35 years, participation on the board gave me a chance to reconnect with children and families. That just keeps my blood flowing. So it's been a wonderful experience."

She remains connected to the district through her work with the Siuslaw Ed-

ucation Foundation, which also works with Mapleton School District, Safe Shelter for Siuslaw Students, 90by30 and more.

"I'm not done yet," Mann-Heintz said. "Thank you so much for letting me be on this board. To the whole community and to the students and the staff, and fellow board members, thank you."

Burns thanked her before he talked about his experiences.

"Every board meeting, we hear about good stuff that our wonderful students are doing. There's always the accomplishments from the principals or from kids that come in to show their skills, ... and that's what this is all about," he said. "Allowing for those things to happen in schools to get our kids to reach their potential. We have done the best we could. I really feel that."

Burns mentioned past board members he served with, and how they had to learn to work together as a team, even if they didn't vote the same way.

"We represent the whole community," he said. "The great thing about having board members from all different parts of the community is that we can hear input from all over."

The school district provided cake and gifts for Burns

and Mann-Heintz.

Director Diana Pimlott, who attended the meeting over Zoom, said, "Paul, Suzanne, thank you for your service to our community over these years. It is nothing less than amazing the amount of time and the dedication that you've put into the district and into our students. And personally, I just want to thank you for your support and guidance over these past two years that I've been on the board."

Director Guy Rosinbaum thanked both directors for working with him and the rest of the board in their time together.

"I hope you make yourself available to the board to pick your brain. Because you have our history and the board could certainly use your wisdom and ... getting people to look at the other side," he said.

Siuslaw School District also honored outgoing teachers and classified staff, several of whom are retiring after numerous years of service. This includes Sean O'Mara, history teacher and assistant volleyball coach at Siuslaw High School, who has been with the district since 1995; Vicki Rankin, who returned after an earlier retirement to help facilitate the end of the school year; Rachel Foster, a special education teacher; Sarah Whisler, physical edu-

cation teacher; John Whisler, elementary teacher; Diane McCalmont, SES secretary; John Rose, SMS football coach; Tom Shinn, SHS assistant football coach; Hope Sneddon, SHS library aide; and Andreus Dunn, SMS library aide.

O'Mara was able to attend the meeting via Zoom, and said, "It's been an honor and it's been a privilege. I will probably miss it more than I think I'm going to right now, but I'm really looking forward to being able to go into the next stage of whatever adventures await me."

Pimlott extended thanks to the teachers and staff leaving the district. "Thank you for your service and dedication to the education and growth of the children in our community."

Grzeskowiak's administrator report also shows new hires for and transfers within the district.

In addition, the new board will meet in July, including newly elected members Maureen Miltenberger and Kady Sneddon.
