Stewart also informed the commission that campground revenue has increased approximately 20 percent from two years ago. Commissioner Rob Ward

said he was pleased with the latest financial review and looks forward to the prospect of optimizing the upgraded spaces, particularly in the off-season.

"So with these added campsites, we are grossing about \$19,000 more a month, when we are full," he said.

He suggested letting people know about Florence in the off months, as well.

"I wonder if we should send out a newsletter sometime around the end of October, saying Florence is great in the winter. Just as a reminder, say, 'Hey, it's great here year round," Ward said.

The commissioner also inquired as to the advertising being done by the

ing to Port Manager David Huntington, "We have quit doing a lot of advertis-

ing in places we used to advertise in quite a bit, mostly be-

cause our occupancy rates have increased every year."

Commissioner Bill Meyer also stated his appreciation for the efforts of both Huntington and Stewart during the pandemic.

"What Kelly and Dave just told us about the difference in the occupancy rates on those new full-service campsites is great news. I like the looks of it. I like being full and I like campsites and the revenue they generate," he

said. "We saw a spread sheet a couple of years ago, when we were doing calculations to figure all that out, and that sure did work out!"

Huntington also updated the commissioners on the modifications being made to one of the port's boats, currently being completed, which will include a new Port of Siuslaw silicone wrap on the exterior of the skiff and a mechanical upgrade.

There was then a brief discussion which resulted in a decision to move a large pile of sand from where it is currently located, to allow for future development of the area, which might result in a net gain of 15 more full-service sites.

The process the port went through two years ago to dredge sections of the marina and slips generated much of the waste materials in the pile and commissioners discussed what would be done when the next dredge takes place.
