I would like to take the time to honor the fallen, thank them for their service to our county and send my deepest sympathies and prayers to their families.

The Sept. 2 attack outside the Hamid Karzai International Airport Kabul, Afghanistan, killed 13 U.S. service members supporting Operation Freedom's Sentinel. Eleven Marines, one Navy corpsman and one soldier were killed as the result of an enemy attack while supporting non-combatant evacuation operations.

- Sgt. Nicole L. Gee, 23, of Sacramento, Calif., assigned to Combat Logistics Battalion 24, 24th Marine Expeditionary Unit, II Marine Expeditionary Force, Camp Lejeune, North Carolina. She was a ground electronics transmission systems maintainer assigned to Combat Logistics Battalion 24, a subordinate unit of Combat Logistics Regiment 27, 2nd Marine Logistics Group, II Marine Expeditionary Force.

The other Marines were assigned to 2nd Battalion, 1st Marine Regiment, 1st Marine Division, I Marine Expeditionary Force, Camp Pendleton, Calif...

The servicemen were members of 2nd Battalion, 1st Marine Regiment, currently forward-deployed with the Special Purpose Marine Air-Ground Task Force-Crisis Response-Central Command, which deployed in February and scheduled to return later

this fall. They were tasked to assist with the evacuation of the U.S. Embassy, U.S. citizens, special immigrant visa applicants, and those Afghans who worked alongside our troops, served alongside of them, and provided invaluable assistance to them.
