

Outside of Florence, the Newport Nextdoor group has a small astronomical community in which members exchange advice on identifying planets, star identification apps, and even used telescopes.

Additionally, the feature of being able to view the bulletins of neighboring areas can encourage residents to expand their typical area of familiarity and to visit nearby towns, cities, and natural features.

In terms of localized

community-building, Nextdoor is a refreshing new interpretation of social media and how it can be used to build real bonds between those living in close proximity. It also is evidence to the fact that technology can be used to foster community and restore tight-knit neighborhood connections without the divisive content of more traditional social platforms.

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
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
