As if the Siuslaw varsity team's play isn't exciting enough, the future of the Viking volleyball program also looks very bright. Twenty-nine girls went out for volleyball this year, only three of which are seniors. The high number of

student-athletes allowed SHS to form three teams: varsity; JV1, coached by Aylenne Vazquez; and JV2, coached by Kya Blake. The JV2 team is undefeated and JV1 has only one loss the entire season.


even able to form a JV team due to lack of players."
