> Follow the tips below to ensure your pets are enjoying their outside adventures this winter:

• Remember, if it's too cold for you, it's cold for your pet, so keep your animals inside. Pets who are unaccustomed to being out in the cold can freeze, become disoriented, lost, stolen, injured or harmed.

• Towel dry your pet as soon as they come inside, paying special attention to their feet and in-between the toes. Remove any snow from between their foot pads.

• Never shave your dog down to the skin in winter, as a longer coat will provide more warmth. If your dog is short-haired, consider get-

LINDBERG—Shane Lindberg, 59, lationship; her longtime companion passed away suddenly on December Bob Rawding; brother Rodney Lind-




