"A low supply of available blood is truly a destabilizing factor for community health," said Lane County Senior Health Officer, Dr. Patrick Luedtke. "Many are not aware that an adequate blood supply is not only necessary to respond to traumatic accidents, but is also a ing blood." An area with the population of Lane County typically requires nearly 1,000 donors per day to meet demand. Since the
