TARIFF, WAGES, AND LABOR.

The statement will not be questioned that in the United States, under a protective tariff, wages are at least fifty per cent higher than in any other part of the world. How far protection to our industries, by the adjustment of the tariff, has contributed to this result, is a matter of every day demonstration.

Carefully prepared tables, under the supervision of the United States Statistical Bureau, have demonstrated the fact that the average wages paid in the United States to artisans, mechanics, and workmen employed in the manufactories is fifty-four per cent higher than the price paid for similar work in England.
