That prince of good correspondents, Capt. C. P. Crandall, writing to the Statesman from Washington, gives the following interesting sketch of Dom Pedro: "Mine eyes have beheld the glory of the coming of a regular monarch—no paste imitation. Dom Pedro II, "Constitutional Emperor and Perpetual Defender of the Brazils," is the man to whom I thus gracefully allude. That is the high sounding public name—the one he wears on state occasions and when he puts his spectacles astride his nose to write his signature to pub. doc His private name, the one to which he answers among the boys, is just D. Pedro d'Alcantara. When he arrived at Washington, he commenced scooting around in such a promiscuous and eccentric way that it was rather difficult to catch him anywhere. When we all rushed to the capitol to see him he was quietly taking an inventory of the Lee Mansion and National cemetery at Arlington; and then when we all stationed ourselves in the vestibule of the White House to intercept his call on the President, he was sitting in the Diplomatic gallery of the House, counting the bald heads in the National menagerie. In short he went everywhere just when we didn't expect him to go, and didn't go anywhere when we did expect him. I began to think the Dom a very lively old Brazilian skipper. At last it was announced in the papers that he would attend the National Theater in the evening, and would occupy his temporarily, royal box, in response to a complimentary (dead-head) invitation from the lovely and divine Volkes. This was my opportunity, and I immediately went down to the National, inspected the box sheet, made a guess which was the Emperors box, and recklessly invested a greenback and a half in a first-class, high-backed, cane-bottomed chair over opposite; I borrowed my landlady's opera glass and went. I was in luck; I had guessed right; the Dom's box was exactly opposite me. The play began and a big stupid, fluffy faced actor had got into the middle of a long dull but orthodoxly moral speech, when the orchestra struck up the Brazilian Grand March, and I knew then that the royal buffer was coming. Sure enough, in a moment he appeared at the front of the box, where he stood bowing, in response to the plaudits of the multitude, till the march was concluded. When he sat down the play went on, and the Dom looked at the people and took a mental photograph of the auditorium of the theater, while a thousand eyes took photographs of him. He is about six feet two, rather portly in figure, with a quiet, manly bearing, eyes gray-blue, hair and full beard well sprinkled with white, face rather full, expression intelligent, quick and frequently lighted with eager interest, dress plain with no ornament whatever, except a modest watch chain and seal. All in all, he is what you would call a fine looking man. He looks to be chock full of energy and determination, and to be not the kind of man who would sit down and whine under misfortune. I think that if he were to lose his throne and fortune, he would buy himself a buck-saw and make it very lively for the wood-piles of Rio Janerio, rather than go to the poor house or become a pensioner upon his mother-in-law. The history of Brazil is full of his praise as a man of liberal ideas, progressive spirit, strong, practical and cultivated mind, political wisdom, firmness united with moderation, and with that quality of modesty which distinguishes the true man from the pretender. He is now about 52 years old; was de-

clared Emperor, with a Regency the successor to Pedro I, at the age of six, and was crowned Emperor at the age of eighteen. He has, therefore, occupied the Brazilian throne about thirty-four years, during which time, he has erected the empire from a colony but lately emancipated from the rule of Portugal, into an empire second in civilization, advanced state of the arts and sciences, and commercial importance in the new world, only to our own. Dom Pedro is perhaps, the most learned (in book lore) and the best informed sovereign alive. Brazil, and the affection of his subjects are his monument—a prouder one than monarch ever carved with the sword."

Drifts and Tow Heads 1876. Upper Astoria, Clatsop county, Oregon. April 24, 1876. At a Special meeting of the Columbia River Fishermen's Beneficial Aid Society, the following regulations for the government of all concerned were adopted. That the following drifts and tow heads be established for the fishing season of 1876. First Drift. From Woody Island to Brown's point. Second Drift. From Brown's Point inside of Snag Island to the 12th red buoy. Third Drift. From the 15th buoy to Tongue Point. Fourth Drift. From Tongue Point to a point a little west of Booth's Cannery, at a place to be designated by a spile or some permanent mark. Fifth Drift. From the termination of the 4th drift to Smith's Point. Sixth Drift. From Smith's Point to the Pacific Ocean. Seventh Drift. From the red buoy in the Prairie channel to Tongue Point up or down. Eighth Drift. The big snag in Chinook shoot will be considered a tow head. The fishermen in Astoria, in council have mutually agreed to bind themselves to be governed by the foregoing drifts, and it is expected from boats outside of the Society that they will also conform to the same.
