Suicide of the Dethroned Sultan.

Telegrams from Constantinople announce the suicide, on Sunday last, of Abdul-Aziz, the recently dethroned Turkish Sultan. To-day his body rests in peace in the mausoleum of Mahmon. Although personally a weak man the late Sultan was the most liberal minded potentate that has ruled in Constantinople. He was the first of his line to visit western Europe. This was in 1867 and although the journey tended to make him popular in England, France and Austria, the countries he visited, it alienated him from the Mussulmans at home, and the leading men of the Empire have ever since visited upon him all the troubles which have befallen his government, until the Softis demanded things and compelled requests which drove him out, hopelessly insane, and as a last resort impelled him to the deed which ended his miserable life as above stated. After his return in 1867 he allowed foreigners to hold real estate in Turkey, established a high school after the model of the French educational institutions, and inaugurated other important liberal branches of reform government.

These and other innovations, together with his attempt to change the orders of succession in favor of his son from his eldest nephew, fomented a spirit of discontent among his Mohamedan subjects. Trouble with the Christian population has been chronic in Turkey for the past half century. How the late aspect of affairs will pacify the Herzegovina and the other disaffected provinces and lead to an amicable settlement of European complications, it is, at this time, difficult to understand. The fault in Turkey has not been with Sovereign but with the system of misrule which has prevailed since the Turks crossed the Dardanelles and established themselves as an European Power.

The new freight and passenger schedule of the O. and C. R. R. Company, took effect on the first of the present month, and does not increase, as anticipated—all classifications remaining as they formerly were except salt, which is reduced one dollar and sixty cents on the car load. We also understand that freights south of Eugene city reduced from an average of seventy-nine cents per hundred to seventy-five. The average cost of transportation to and from, Eugene City, sixty-three cents per hundred. We are pleased to learn that the authorities see fit to reduce rather than increase.

The Dalles people won't celebrate at Portland, Centennial week because the Evening Journal said a high old Dalles saloon was established in a church. The Tribune repels the base slander by saying that there is no such a thing there, and that the Dalles people, including saloon men, have some ideas of propriety and the "eternal fitness of things," as well as people in Portland.

The Illinois Circuit Court have decided the Chicago Mayorality case favorable to Colvin. But the thing is yet a muddle. Just how they are to proceed now is beyond our dull comprehension. A later dispatch says an election was ordered for June 27th. That will fix it up, maybe.

The Jarrett & Palmer reached San Francisco on the 4th, just eighty-three hours, thirty-two minutes, and seven seconds from Jersey City.

Dr. J. C. Ayer, of Lowell, Mass., the noted patent medicine-man, was sent to the Asylum on Monday, insane.

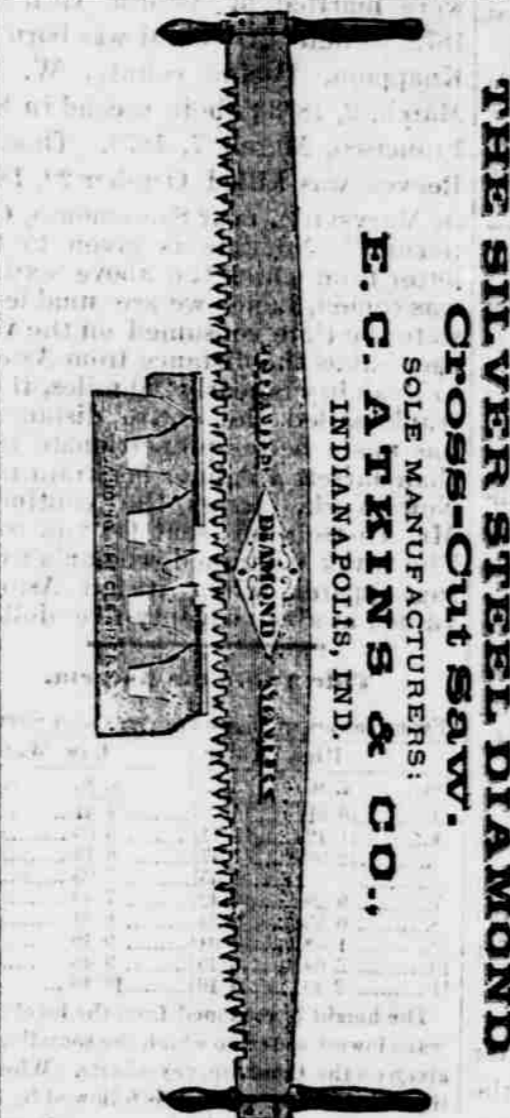
