Upper Astoria, Clatsop county, Oregon. }
April 24, 1876.

At a Special meeting of the Columbia River Fishermens Beneficial Aid Society, the following regulations for the government of all concerned were adopted. That the following drifts and tow heads be established for the fishing season of 1876.

First Drift. From Woody Island

to Brown's point. Second Drift. From Brown's Point inside of Snag Island to the 12th red

Third Drift. From the 15th buoy to Tongue Point.

Fourth Drift. From Tongue Point to a point a little west of Booth's Cannery, at a place to be designated by a spile or some permanent mark.
Fifth Drift. From the termination of the 4th drift to Smith's Point. Sixth Drift. From Smith's Point to the Pacific Ocean.

Seventh Drift. From the red buoy in the Prairie channel to Tongue Point up or down.


