Dispatches from Cincinnati dated on the 14th, give lengthy reports of the Republican National Convention which met at noon on that day. The attendance was greater than at any previous gathering of the party, and embraced some of the most noted men in its ranks. A number of colored delegates were present, Telegraphic transfers on New York 1 per and their presence caused some surprise. Among them were Congressmen and ex-Congressmen from South Carolina, Alabama, and other Southern States. The convention was called to or-Flour.—Extra, 65 50 a6 00.

Wheat—Shippers will give \$170 for choice of alongside vessels; millers are paying man of the Republicant National man of the Republican National Committee, who introduced the Rev. Dr. Miller, of Covington, Ky., who made a prayer. After the speaking was over the committee on permanent organization made its report, recommending Edward McPherson, long the clerk in the House of Representatives, for presiding officer. The committee first selected Morton McPhail of Philadelphia, but he was unwell and unable to preside. McPherson was chosen.

Speeches were made by Governor Morgan, Hon. T. W. Pomeroy of New York, Gen. Logan, Gen. Hawley, ex-Governor Noyes, of Ohio, Wm. A. Howard of Michigan, Fred Douglas and oth-

Loring of Massachusetts then came forward and read the report of the committee on organization.

The New York Times, referring to the action of the convention, says: people who read the evening papers must have jumped to the conclusion that Blaine's friends have captured the convention, and that their candidate had the nomination within

reach. The attentive reader of this mornings dispatches in the Times will come to a different conclusion, and we need hardly say that our correspondents are all instructed simply to state what they believe to be true.

Other papers hold to conflicting opinions. Correspondents are hopelessly irrecconcilable, the World declaring Blaine reasonably sure of success; the Times, on the contrary, showing by facts and figures that he is not so strong as yesterday, and weakening steadily. Nearly all correspondents conclude to think that the well known candidates will kill each other off.

The Herald's Washington dispatch states that leading Democrats in Congress say there are matters behind, which will be brought out on Blaine, if he should be nominated, that will prove fatal to him. One of these gentlemen said that the Republican party could not elect Blaine. He spoke candidly, and enjoys the reputation of always acting honorably, even, sometimes, at the expense of political advan-

A San Francisco dispatch of the 14th says that the small pox, which a week ago seemed dying out, has apparently taken a new lease of life. On Sunday four cases were reported, Monday, one Tuesday two, and Wednesday seven, of which five were in one family. All exhibit a mild type of the disease except one Chinamen, who died. The new cases are pretty well scattered.

A prominent grain operator gives the California surplus wheat for shipment this season at three quarters of a million short tons, exceeding by 200,000 tons the crop of 1872, The yield is unusually heavy in all parts of the State, and in quality the best ever known in the State. He gives the price for July delivery along side the ship at 96 cents per bushel. He anticipates no difficulty in procuring labor for harvesting, or transportation from the interior, unless the bulk of the crop is held until late in the season, which would probably over-tax the railroad facilities. Tonnage here and known to be on the way amounts to 450,000 tons carrying capacity, and enough is expected between now and December to take all offered. The surplus barley is estimated at 75,000 tens at fifty cents alongside the ship.

The C. & O. Stage Company commenced running on fast summer time on the 15th, making the trip from Redding to Roseburg in fifty-two nours.
