Oregon Summer.

From the Standard, June 26. The important advantage that Oregon has over California in the matter of unfailling seasons has been well ventilated and will be thoroughly understood after awhile by immigrants seeking homes on this Pacific coast. But another and equal important advantage is the great mildness of our summer. We published yesterday an extract from the San Francisco Bulletin showing the extreme heat now obtaining in California—the thermometer at points in the interior going up to 113 degrees. It is burning up the crops, the vegetation, the roses and the leafy June trees are shedding their leaves so rapidly as to indicate Autumn instead of mid-Summer. Here we have almost the geniality of smiling Spring, just enough of heat to make the weather delightful, while blankets are indispensable at night. It is true the mercury indicates what would in the east be a high degree of heat, but the same laws do not seem to govern the weather here as there. Here at ninety degrees it is not disagreeably hot, though in New York it would melt all the paper collars in use on Broadway. The difference is said to result from the greater dryness of our atmosphere; that when we have hot weather the heat passes out from the body; that the pores are all open and so sensitive that the slightest change of temperature produces chilliness, and that the hot Eastern atmosphere, being humid, causes the heat to be retained. Here the caloric radiates from one; there it continues to accumulate. Here though it passes up to the nineties at times, it never gets on beyond a hundred as in California, and our vegetation is never burned up. An Oregon Summer is one of the most delightful enjoyments in nature, and when its extraordinary character shall become thoroughly understood our State will become the summering place of the wealthy who live below us and of many eastern people. Our lovely bays will become more famous than the Italian and our beautiful sea beaches will furnish watering places more sought after than Long Island and Saratoga, Yaquina, Coos, Tillamook and Umpqua bays will yet be famous.

ADVERTISING BY SPLURGES.—Profitable and successful advertising is an art founded upon principles which may be said to constitute a science. Most sagacious business men who advertise extensively do not go upon blind, irregular impulses, but proceed according to an intelligent and well-considered system which they have deliberately adopted. Such men understand perfectly that one of the most valuable secrets of profitable advertising consists in constantly keeping themselves and their special line of business before the public. The name of the firm, its location and the articles or class of articles in which it deals, must be familiarized to the public eye, and through that to the public mind. It is the constant dripping that makes the impression upon even the hardest rock. To effect this, steady and continuous advertising is far better than occasional splurges, no matter how showy and attractive. It is no doubt true that a big splurge three or four times a year, filling a column or two with display heads and double-headed matter, has its effect. But unless these spasmodic appeals are supplemented and reinforced by small standing advertisements they are in danger of making no lasting impression. In the long run the persistent advertiser, whose name stays the reader in the face every time he takes up his paper, will accomplish his object much more effectually than his rival who relies upon a splurge every three or six months. This is a principle which needs only to be started in, order to secure recognition by sagacious business men; and almost all men of that class who have succeeded in building up a great business by advertising have acted upon it.

Small is the sum that is required to patronize a newspaper, amply rewarded is its patron, I care not how humble and unpretending the gazette which he takes. It is next to impossible to fill a sheet with printed matter without putting into it something worth the subscription price. Every parent whose son is away from home at school, should supply him with a newspaper. I will remember what a marked difference there was between my schoolmates who had not access to newspapers. Other things being equal the first were always decidedly superior to the last in debate, composition and general intelligence.—Daniel Webster.

SEND THE STAMPS.—When you want a copy of a newspaper send the value of it in stamps, then you will not be disappointed. If you are a correspondent or have an advertisement in the paper, you are entitled to a complimentary copy of the paper containing it sent to your post-office, at the time of publication; for it takes time to hunt up a copy three or six months after it is published and time costs money in a printing office, so send enough stamps to pay the publisher for the paper and time required to hunt it up. Another point: When you write to a man for your own information and benefit, and which you are sure would be of no interest or benefit to him, inclose stamps to pay both postage and the value of the writing material used and you will, very likely, get the information desired.
