OREGON SUMMERS. From the Standard.

The important advantage that Oregon has over California in the matter of unfailing seasons has been well ventilated and will be thoroughly understood after awhile by immigrants seeking homes on this Pacific coast. But another and equal important advantage is the great mildness of our summer. We published yesterday an extract from the San Francisco Bulletin showing the extreme heat now obtaining in California-the thermometer at points in the interior going up to 113 degrees. It is burning up the crops, the vegetation, the roses and the leafy June trees are shedding their leaves so rapidly as to indicate Autumn instead of mid-Sum-mer. Here we have almost the gen-iality of smiling Spring, just enough of heat to make the weather delightful, while blankets are indispensable at night. It is true the mercury indicates what would in the east be a high degree of heat, but the same laws do not seem to govern the weath-er here as there. Here at ninety de-grees it is not disagreeably hot, though in New York it would melt all the paper collars in use on Broad-way. The difference is said to result way. The difference is said to result from the greater dryness of our atmosphere; that when we have hot weather the heat passes out from the weather the heat passes out from the body; that the pores are all open and so sensitive that the slightest change of temperature produces chilliness, and that the hot Eastern atmosphere, being humid, causes the heat to be retained. SEND THE STAMPS .- When you want a copy of a nespaper send the value of it in stamps, then you will not be disappointed. If you are a corre-pondent or have an advertisement in the paper, you are entitled to a complimentary copy of the paper containing it sent to your postoffice, at the time of publication; for it takes time to hunt up a copy three or six months after it is published and time costs money in a printing office, so send enough stamps to pay the publisher for the paper and time required to hust it up. Another point: When you write to a man for your own information and benefit, and which you are satsfied would be of no interest or benefit to him, inclose stamps to pay both postage and the value of the writing material used, and you will, very likely, get the information desired. +0+ 22 Small is the sum that is required to patronize a newspaper, amply rewarded is its patron, I care not how humble and unpretending the gazette which he takes. It is next to impossible to fill a sheet with pricted matter without put-ting into it something worth the subscription price. 
