On the other hand, Wade Hampton, who told the people of Illinois that they stood in the same light before history as he did, and that they merely "went with their State," has been applauded as a patroit, and has had his boots licked into lustrous offulgence by such editors Squemoe ha street, between Washington and as those of the Chicago Tribune and the Cincinnati Commercial. We must accordingly look on it as a settled principle that the lost cause was quite as but the best material used.
