—Dr. John O'Brien, who has been dangerously ill, is now considered out of danger.

—Frank S. Lord returned to Westminister by the steamship California yesterday.

—John Adair, jr., S. D. Adair, and Wm. Adair, were passengers to San Francisco by the steamship Geo. W. Elder yesterday.

—The wheat now in Astoria at the Farmers dock is in good demand. It is the only grain in the state that can be moved at present.

—In consequence of the ice-blockade Capt. Thatcher will remain at Astoria and the ship Garibaldi will not be snored at Westport as was expected.

—Capt. Carroll informs us that he expects to return to Astoria with the steamship Great Republic, soon after his arrival in San Francisco.

—The steamship Great Republic got quite respectable freight at Astoria, yesterday, notwithstanding the freeze-up shut off communication with the metropolis.

—In our next issue we will publish the subjects for the week of prayer, and the programme for the union meetings to be held by the Congregational, Methodist, Baptist and Presbyterian churches in this city.

—The river is closed. Portland can now "sit like a fat duck upon the pearly edges of prosperity"—and suck her thumbs. No mail boat arrived at Astoria from the Wallamet yesterday—none will leave here to-day for that region.

—Yesterday morning Astorians were treated to a fall of snow which was indescribably beautiful. It stormed until nearly 10 o'clock A. M., and was sufficient to cover the entire face of the country with a mantle of whiteness of virgin purity.

—We learn that the family of Mr. A. McKay, of Walla Walla county are deeply afflicted by diphtheria in their family. They lost their youngest son Robert, on the 25th ult., and we have been informed that their entire family of little ones has been taken. Mrs. McKay is a sister of Mrs. Samuel Gray of this city.

—Nearly a riot occurred in Astoria yesterday, incident to the practice of snow-balling, which is in itself an innocent amusement if not abused. The attacking of defenseless celestials by a large class of boys and boy-men, lead to troubles which should have been nipped in the bud by prompt interference on the part of the police, and thus saved the city a disgrace which we are pleased to say: It is fortunate was no worse.

—Mr. Josiah West, one of the most successful farmers of Clatsop county, paid us a social visit yesterday, and left substantial token of his appreciation of THE ASTORIAN. Mr. West began operations six or seven years ago on Clatsop with part of one farm and sixteen head of cows. He now has three farms, and over one hundred head of cows, and is fitted with many of the modern appliances such as farm machinery, etc. He is to-day working off his stock of cheese, and going out of that branch of business.

Burial of Ferdinand Ferrell.

In our notice yesterday respecting the death of Mr. Ferrell, we omitted to mention another important fact concerning his life-long services for the good of the community by which he was surrounded. He was one of the oldest members of the Astoria fire department, and has devoted very much time toward building it up, and placing it upon a sound basis. This service was duly recognized yesterday by an extra large attendance of the members of the department, in full uniform. The funeral was conducted under the auspices of the fraternity of Odd Fellows, Beaver Lodge appearing in regular and in full force of all its membership present in the city, as well as a full delegation of sojourning brethren. Astoria Engine Co. No. 1, of which Mr. Ferrell was a member, headed the procession, followed by Rescue Engine Co. No. 2, Alert Hook and Ladder Co. No. 1, and members of the Board of Delegates. The services were conducted at the church by Rev. O. Parker, Rector of Grace church parish, and at the cemetery by Hon. I. W. Case, D. D. G. M., and Rev. J. T. Wolfe, chaplain. After returning to the hall, Beaver Lodge No. 35 I. O. O. F. adopted the following:

In Memory of Our Departed Brother Ferdinand Ferrell.

WHEREAS, It has pleased Almighty God, in his wisdom and goodness, to remove from our midst our beloved brother Ferdinand Ferrell, therefore be it resolved, by Beaver Lodge No. 35, I. O. O. F., in special meeting this day assembled:

FIRST, That we bow in submission to the Divine will, feeling deeply grieved at the death of one whom, by his life-long fidelity, has proven himself so true to the principles of our beloved order.

SECOND, That by the death of Brother Ferrell, Beaver Lodge No. 35, has lost one of its most faithful members; one whose mission has been to relieve the distressed, visit the sick, and bury the dead, with all the true characteristics on one devoted to Odd Fellowship; has lost one whose promptness on all occasions to show manifestations of love of his country proves that the charges of the Post Grand were at all times fully realized by him; has lost one whose great benevolence and kind disposition has ever served to teach us to remember those most important lessons of our order.

THIRD, That we deeply sympathize and mourn with the bereaved widow and family in this, their hour of affliction; who, having lost a loving husband and a fond father, are commended to The Father of all, since loving words and tender acts of human sympathy are too feeble to reach the deep and painful grief caused by the removal of one so loved, so honored, in the home which he cherished with such tender affection.

FOURTH, That the lessons of the life of our deceased brother be cherished with a desire that they inspire us with higher resolves, more fervent aspirations for usefulness, stronger desire for attainment of excellences of character; and may his death admonish us all that life is the span of man's activities, and that whatsoever the hand findeth to do, it do with our might, that it may be said of us as we now say of him. "He did nobly, he did well."

FIFTH, That a copy of these resolutions be suitably drafted and presented to the family of our deceased brother, and that a copy be spread upon a Memorial Page in the records of this meeting.
