FAMILY ROW AT A DIVISION OF THE SPOILS.

MAJOR RENO'S ESTIMATE OF GEN. CUSTER AS A SOLDIER.

MACHINERY HALL SOLD FOR A MEERE CIPHER OF ITS COST.

THE UNEMPLOYED LABORERS OF NEW YORK CITY.

SEND THEM TO OREGON AND WASHINGTON TERRITORY.

THE BILL FOR TRANSFERRING THE INDIAN BUREAU TO THE WAR DEPARTMENT KILLED FOR THIS CONGRESS.

MCLANSBORO, Feb. 8.—In a dispute last night about the division of some inherited property, Frank Morris and his brother Charles were killed by their brothers-in-law, Wm. Hale and Mr. Craig, whom they had assaulted.

CHICAGO, Feb. 8.—Major Reno on the stand to-day, was pressed as to his opinion of Custer, and finally confessed that he had no confidence in him as a soldier; but said that his relations with Custer were friendly.

PHILADELPHIA, Feb. 9.—Machinery hall on the Centennial grounds, which originally cost \$800,000, was sold at auction yesterday to W. C. Allison & Co. for \$24,000.

NEW YORK, Feb.—Statistics show that the number of unemployed mechanics and laborers in this city is now 15,500, of which there are laborers, 3,000; carpenters, 8,000; masons and stone-cutters, 1,000; tailors, 1,000; brick-layers, 800; painters, 800; plasterers, 600; cigar-makers, 300.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 8.—The house of representatives, after a long discussion, has rejected the Barnes' amendment for the transfer of the Indian bureau to the war department. The vote was 83 ayes to 101 noes. This kills it for the present congress.

THE PLAGUE IN THE EAST—THE STRIKE IN LIVERPOOL.

FRANCE AND GERMANY AND CATHOLICISM.

LONDON, Feb. 9.—From 15 to 20 fresh cases of the plague occur daily near Xanthe in Thessaly, and that there is great mortality from the same cause at Raslog.

ST. PETERSBURG, Feb. 9.—No cases of the plague at Astraschau since the 6th inst. Cemeteries are being arranged for the dead.

MADRID, Feb. 7.—Quarantine against the plague has been ordered in all Spanish ports.

BERLIN, Feb. 8.—Twenty-two hundred Catholic ladies of the Rhine provinces have forwarded a petition to the emperor against the suppression of the Ursuline convents of Nonnenwerth and Trawler.

ROME, Feb. 8.—Cardinal Guibert, archbishop of Paris, reports his interview with Grevy as cordial, but says that the radicals will insist upon the separation of church and state.

LONDON, Feb. 7.—From thirty to thirty-five thousand men are now on a strike at Liverpool. At Princess dock the mob boarded the bark Oora,

from Wilmington, N. C., unloading resin, and extinguished the fires in her donkey engines, and cut the hoisting gear. This mob numbered about three thousand. Smaller mobs terrorized laborers at Queen's, Nelson's and Bramley works. The police were reinforced last night, especially near the Sailor's Home. A number of laborers sent to Liverpool from Wolverhampton were compelled to return, by threats of murder.

LONDON, Feb. 8.—Steamships and sailing vessels are detained owing to the strike, and the difficulty of procuring seamen. Troops of cavalry paraded the docks to-day.

A LADY KILLED BY A FALLING SIGNBOARD.
