The fishermen's meeting at Metropolitan hall on Tuesday evening passed off quietly, and probably no trouble will arise this season.

The Annie M. Small entered this port May 20th, 1878. She went to sea yesterday with full cargo of wheat drawing 19 1/2 feet, Brehan towing, Hansen pilot.

Mr. A. M. Johnson has just completed a fine lot of sails for the schooner Alpha, and is now busily engaged in making sails for the use of fishermen the coming season.

The ship Ericsson, of 1,048 tons measurement, built at Williamsburg, Long Island, in 1852, was sold at San Francisco last week to Capt. George Plummer and G. L. Dingley & Co., for \$34,000.

In a letter to Chaplain Stubbs from the brother-in-law of Eugene L. Avery, known as Archie Brown, it is stated that his mother who intended to visit him before his execution will not come.

The schooner Premier, one of the Port Ludlow built three masted shoners, was sold in San Francisco last week for \$18,000. Her owners, Jensen and others, will continue her in the coasting trade.

It appears that Colfax is to have a baptist church. A corporation consisting of five persons has been formed, with capital stock amounting to fifteen hundred dollars. The chief place of business is at Colfax, Whitman county.

Common Council Proceedings.

COUNCIL CHAMBER, ASTORIA, March 4, 1879.

Council met in regular session with President Gray presiding.

Councilmen present—Gray, Hahn, McCann, McGuire, Runey, Shively.

In attendance auditor and clerk, R. H. Cardwell, and chief of police, W. J. Barry.

Minutes of previous meeting read and approved.

PETITIONS.

From N. F. Mudge, asking to be reimbursed in the sum of \$310.28 discount on warrants received in payment for work on roadway, was read and on motion laid on the table.

From Geo. W. Res, containing charges against H. B. Parker, police judge, was read and on motion referred to committee on health and police.

From C. Gilbert, asking that the obstructions on West-9th street be removed, was read and on motion referred to committee on streets and public ways.

From Nick Clinton, asking to be reimbursed in the sum of \$25.00, discount on warrants received in payment for work on roadway, was read and on motion laid on the table.

From James W. Welch, asking that the proposed widening of the sidewalks on Water street, be postponed until the decision of the supreme court in the case of James Taylor vs. Welch heirs, was read and on motion petition granted.

REPORT OF COMMITTEES.

Report of committee on health and police on the matter of the purchase of stars, clubs, and nippers for the police force, was read and on motion adopted.

Report of committee on fire and water on communication of C. J. Trenchard chief engineer A. F. D. in regard to the unsafe condition of certain chimneys in China houses, was read and on motion adopted.

Report of committee on rules and regulations on an ordinance prohibiting the setting fire to timber etc., within the limits of the city, was read and on motion adopted.

Report of committee on health and police on the matter of the hearing of W. G. Ross and C. W. Laughery, was read and on motion adopted, and ordered placed on file.

REPORTS OF OFFICERS.

Report of H. E. Parker, police judge, for the month of February, was read and on motion ordered received and placed on file.

Report of R. F. Wickham for the month of February, was read and on motion referred to committee on streets and public ways.

Report of James Stewart, city sexton was read and on motion referred to committee on public property.

ORDINANCES.

An ordinance to provide for regulating and licensing bar-rooms and drinking shops, was read the first and second time, and on motion referred to committee on health and police.

An ordinance to regulate and license certain places of amusement, was read the first and second time, and on motion referred to the committee on health and police.

An ordinance authorizing the auditor and clerk to draw warrant for expense of the board of delegates of A. F. D. was read the first and second time and on motion referred to the committee on fire and water.

An ordinance to provide for the working and collection of road tax within the city limits, was read the first and second time, and on motion, referred to committee on streets and public ways.

An ordinance making an appropriation out of the general fund for purchase of hose for Astoria fire department, was read the first and second time and by unanimous consent the rules were suspended and the ordinance read the third time and passed.

An ordinance making an appropriation out of the general fund for the engine Co. No. 2, was read the first purchasing of a Silby heater for Rescue and second time and by unanimous consent the rules were suspended and the ordinance read the third time and passed.

Councilman McGuire offered a resolution authorizing and empowering the chief of police to appoint and remove officers of the police force, by

and with the consent of a majority of the council, which resolution was adopted.

On motion of councilman Runey the city attorney was instructed to draft an ordinance reducing the salary of that officer to \$10 per month, the same to take effect April 1, 1879.

Councilman Hahn nominated hos. Logan for superintendent of streets to fill the vacancy caused by the removal of R. F. Wickham.

Mr. Logan was duly confirmed as such superintendent of streets.
