TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

Pacific Coast Dispatches.

—U. S. inspectors have finished the inquiry into the ferry-boat disaster at San Francisco and find no one to blame.

—The steamer Olympia, recently purchased by the Hudson Bay company, is to have her name changed to Princess Louise.

—The bark Don Nicholas from Departure bay for San Francisco has been towed into Port Angeles disabled having encountered terrific gales which carried away sails and masts.

—An appeal is taken in the case of the Tullis murderers, Dye and Anderson, and they will not be hung on the 13th inst. The appeal insures the cases being put off so that if the execution of the judgment is affirmed it cannot take place before late in July or early in August.

—There is no longer hope for a compromise between Sutro and the mining companies. Representatives of the companies report that their efforts to get Sutro to agree to the ultimatum have failed. The difficulty is that Sutro cannot be brought to stand by his verbal agreements long enough to get them on paper. Managers on the part of the companies admit that they have withdrawn from arbitration, and that for the present there will be no compromise on either hand.

The old and extensive firm of Godchaux Bros. & Co., importers and dealers in foreign dry-goods and notions, was attached on the 5th. The failure is disastrous. The assets of the firm amount to only \$475,000, of which \$75,000 is in stock; liabilities are over \$1,000,000. Creditors are garnishing debts wherever due. Much of the \$900,000 due the firm has been assigned to creditors previous to the announcement of the failure, and much of it is due from retail houses in this city, which have also become embarrassed. It is asserted that there will be a shrinkage probably 50 per cent. in the amount of assets stated.

—A San Francisco dispatch says: The most drenching rain of the season is that which has prevailed during the past 36 hours. Over three inches of rain has fallen on the peninsula, and the storm has been general throughout the central and northern parts of the state. Considerable damage is reported in Napa, Solano and Sonoma counties from the storm. Mail advices from Eureka report much damage. In the vicinity of Humboldt bay, rivers have overflowed the banks, bridges have been carried away, stage and telegraph connection suspended, farming land flooded, and fences, out-buildings and dwellings swept away. Two lives are known to have been lost, several persons injured, and the loss of stock is very heavy.

Eastern News.

—The Union Pacific Railroad company have purchased the Kansas Pacific road, and hereafter they will be operated as one.

—A famine is raging in the most fertile part of Bolivia, district of Cochakambi, in different localities in the department. From one to ten persons die daily of starvation. In a small town 208 persons died from want of food in 20 days.

—The refusal of the British bondholders to advance capital to build a railroad from the city of Mexico to the Pacific, leaves the field clear for American enterprises. It is obvious that the railroad system of that country can be developed successfully only in concert with American lines.

—The national capital has become the scene of a very exciting canvass for the speakership of the next house, and of contests which permeate political circles in every direction for all

the other offices of both branches of congress. Speaker Randall is a candidate for re-election, and enters the race with many noticeable advantages derived from his possession of the office during three sessions of congress, and the good use he has made of it. Randall is a Tilden democrat, but may be beaten by a greenback republican.

—A mysterious dispensation in Chicago on the 8th, sent prices of wheat down 5 or 6 cents and created a panic on 'change. There have been many days when the prices of wheat fluctuated 5 to 10 cents per bushel; but there has scarcely been a more general interest felt on any of those occasions than on the 8th, and certainly none where the cause was more occult. Fraud was claimed, and Archie Fisher made a statement showing that the whole amount of wheat sold upon the bogus order signed by Keene has been re-purchased and without any loss to his firm or Keene.

—We publish the following dispatch from Cincinnati under date of the 5th as a subject for reference of deep interest to the editor of THE ASTORIAN who still holds a claim in the mine referred to: A number of wealthy citizens are greatly excited over a report of a strike of gold in an Idaho mine of which they are owners. Their information states that a very rich vein of gold has been reached in the 200-foot level, and that it furnished ore yielding from \$1,500 to \$2,500 per ton in gold and silver. The vein increases in size and richness as it is worked, and it is regarded by those in charge as one of the richest mines in the country. Mr. Shillet declares today that \$1,000,000 would not induce him to part with his interest. The whole party of owners will start shortly for the mine, which is located in Alturas county, 200 miles from the railroad.

Foreign News.

—The German brig Bertha Hein, from San Francisco, Nov. 27, for Rio Grande de Sul, Brazil, is ashore at that port.

—The damage by storm in the canton of Vaud, Switzerland, is estimated at 4,000,000 francs. In the Lausanne district 400,000 trees were destroyed.

—The khedive has informed the governments of England and France that he will appoint Nuba Pasha foreign minister if they insist, but he must decline all responsibility for the consequences.

—The judgement of the court martial on the ironclad disaster Berlin, lays the principal blame upon the officers in charge of the Koenig Wilhelm at the time of her collision with the Grosser Kurfurst.

—Passanante, the would be assassin of the king of Italy, has been found guilty and condemned to death. When asked by his counsel if he wished to take an appeal, replied "No; I wish to die soon."

—Large quantities of grain are stored in Little Wallachia, Servia and Romania, awaiting the opening of navigation. In Hungary, along the Danube, we hear preparations are made for large shipments.

—Kingston, Jamaica, news to Feb. 24th, says that the revolutionary party in Hayti still threatens overthrow of the government. The whole northern portion is in arms. The president thinks he will save his government.

—The accumulation of silver in Austrian banks has been a nuisance which both the banks and the government are endeavoring to get rid of. The people, who have been accustomed to handling paper currency for thirty years, are unwilling to use silver.

—A Burlington dispatch of the 6th

says that Bavaria objects to the adoption of a uniform railway tariff as proposed by the imperial government, alleging that the privileges which she secured when she joined the empire are infringed by the present attempt of the federal council and legislature to legislate for Bavaria.
