TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

Eastern News.

-The Southern bank of New Orleans has suspended.

-Paul Boyton re-commenced his swim to New Orleans Tuesday morning from Cincinnati.

-Scientific examination of the sulphur which fell in a shower on the 17th, over Lehigh valley prove it to be the pullen from species of pine, caught up by the wind and carried from the Jersey forests.

-Mexico desires to establish more intimate commercial relations with the United States. She produces many things largely consumed by this country which she wishes to sell us, and is anxious to purchase many of our products, especially machinery of all descriptions and manufactures.

-The Oliver-Cameron suit is furnishing "smutty" reading for the eastern public. Old Simon deserves punishment no doubt for being eaught by the shameless woman. The Times says that the unanimity of expression as to the favorable outlook is more trustworthy because each enquirer was pursuing his investigation entirely unbiased and independent of any other.

Paris, March 18.—The French minister of finance yesterday repaid to the bank of France 65,000,-000 francs, the last instalment of the milliard borrowed from the bank during the war.

Berray, March 18 .- The tariff commission seems particularly anxious to secure German industry against American competition. It has proposed heavy duties upon most articles now imported from America. Its last decision is in favor of a duty of twenty marks per hundred weight on leather goods. Protectionists are now attaking the present coinage system and recommend the issue of plenty of money.
