TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

Pacific Coast Dispatches.

The barkentine North Bend, which collided with the ship Mercury off Cape Foulweather on the morning of the 21st, arrived at Seattle a day or two ago. Her anchor was broken, and her rail near the cats-head stove in. The ship drifted along her side, staying in her rail, and breaking several of her stanchions, besides carrying away some of her rigging. The night was very dark, and shortly after the collision one of the crew of the North Bend, a sailor by the name of Jack Flynn, was missing. Her injuries were all above water, and hence she was not much disabled.

Eastern States.

Col. Thos. A. Scott has been re-elected president of the Pennsylvania railroad.

A bill introduced by Senator Slater on Wednesday directs the secretary of the interior to negotiate with the Umatilla, Warm Spring, Klamath and Siletz reservation Indians for their removal to lands outside of the boundaries of Oregon; provides that immediately upon their removal all lands now occupied by them shall be opened for settlement and purchase under the general land law. It is provided, however, that any Indian desiring to abandon his tribal relations shall be entitled to select and obtain a title to 160 acres under the homestead or pre-emption law.

Judge J. M. Elliott of the court of appeals, was assaulted and instantly killed on the streets in front of the Capital hotel in Frankfort, Ky., on the 26th, by Thos. Buford, of Henry county. Elliott had rendered an adverse opinion in a case Buford had in court for some time. Buford loaded a double barrel shotgun, waited for Elliott to come to dinner, walked up and shot him through the heart without warning. Buford was arrested and is now in jail. There is great excitement. Buford after his arrest acknowledged that the other barrel of his gun was loaded for Judge Pryor and would have killed him also had not some children been in the way.

Foreign News.

There is not a single boat at Deyasanya, and great loss of life is certain if the flood increases.

Mukhtar Pasha has asked for 40,000 men and 100 canoes, for the fortification of various frontier towns.

Upward of one hundred arrests have been made in Moscow in consequence of the assassination of a government spy.

Renewed floods in Hungary have covered 12,000 acres of land, which had already been sown, and the lives of 12,000 people are endangered.

Emperor William, in his replies to congratulation at the reception held on his birthday, laid special stress on his desire to continue a pacific policy.

Famine in Upper Egypt causes terrible suffering. In some villages people are naked like wild beasts, and dig for roots. In one town women and children fought over scraps of bread. Inland villages are said to be starving like dogs.
