TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

Late Eastern Elections.

—Boardman, republican was re-elected mayor by 150 majority over the democratic and greenback candidates, in Calais, Maine.

—The Council Bluffs, Iowa, election resulted in a draw. The republicans elected marshal and treasurer, and the democrats mayor, recorder, and assessor, and three or four aldermen.

—The democrats of Sandusky, Ohio, elected Sloane mayor by 600 majority. The school board, the marshal and commissioners, and probably the solicitor, are republicans. The democrats are jubilant over the election.

—The entire republican ticket was elected in Keokuk, with the exception of one greenback alderman. Two other greenbacks were elected in wards where the republicans made no nominations. The vote was unusually large.

—In Hartford, Connecticut, the republicans elect the city auditor and marshal by an average plurality of over 300, and the democrats the city clerk and treasurer by an average plurality of 170. The republicans retain the control of the common council.

—Sufficient returns are in to demonstrate that the republicans of Columbus, Ohio, have swept the city and elected G. G. Collins mayor and all the balance of the ticket. This is the first time republicans have elected their candidate for mayor since 1858.

—The republicans in Cleveland, Ohio, have elected the whole city ticket, with a probable exception of police judge, by 1,500 majority. Democrats and greenbacks had combined against them. Advices from smaller towns on the reserve show republican victories.

—The republicans in Cincinnati claim the election of Jacobs for mayor over Harris by 10,000 majority. The vote polled was unusually heavy, equal to the cast at last presidential election. The republicans also claim the election of the entire city ticket, with the possible exception of police judge.

—At Grand Rapids the citizens' ticket, composed of hard money republicans and democrats, is elected. At Lansing, the republicans elect the entire city ticket. At Jackson, the democrats elect the mayor and the republicans the balance of the city ticket. At East Saginaw, republicans elect the mayor, the balance of the city ticket is mixed.

—John Logan Chipman is elected judge of the superior court of Detroit, Michigan, by a plurality of 1,511 and a majority of 46 over both the republican and national candidates. Returns from the interior come in slowly. The majority on the republican state ticket is estimated at from five to ten thousand over the democratic and greenback coalition ticket.

Eastern States.

—President Hayes will not, after all, go to the Pacific coast during the coming summer, and says that he expects to pass most of the season at Washington. This is "too bad!"

—Last Monday night, in Chicago, Rev. Arthur Swazey sighted with a powerful telescope Brossen's comet. Its declination was 29 degrees 58 minutes, and right ascension both 3 hours 40 minutes.

—The funeral of Madame Patterson Bonaparte took place in Baltimore on Monday. The Rev. Dr. Luftwich, of the Presbyterian church, offered a prayer at her house, the only religious service before the procession started for Greenmount cemetery. The chief mourners were her grandsons, Col.

Jerome Napoleon and Charles Joseph Bonaparte and the family of the latter. At the grave Dr. Luftwich read a burial service and the interment took place. The coffin bore the inscription: "Elizabeth Patterson, born on the 6th of February, 1785; died, April 4th, 1879." Interment was made in a lot purchased by the lady herself, many years ago, for her last resting place. Deceased was a daughter of a merchant of Baltimore, married Jerome Bonaparte, brother of Napoleon, on his visit to America as captain of a frigate in the year 1803. The alliance displeased Napoleon, who had higher designs for his family; so he annulled the marriage with Miss Patterson and caused his brother to marry a daughter of the king of Wurtemberg. Madame Patterson Bonaparte was a celebrity in her day.

Foreign News.

—At supplementary elections in Paris for deputies, the moderate republicans generally defeated their radical competitors.

—The outbreak of the cattle disease threatens to seriously embarrass the British commissariats. Cattle are dying by scores.

—A more pathetic scene than that of Garibaldi's arrival in Rome has seldom been beheld. Shouts raised as the train entered the station were speedily silenced on the circulation of a report that the general was ill. He was carried from the train on a mattress placed on a large litter. Politics are wholly disconnected with his coming. He found that his health was not improving at Caprea. Replying to an aid who visited him in the king's name, he said that he did not himself know the reason of his visit. Some say that he came to Rome to die.

Pacific Coast Dispatches.

—The weather was so rough at Port Townsend on the 7th inst. that the steamer Isabel, for Victoria, with 800 sheep aboard, returned, being unable to cross.

—The damages done by the recent freshets on the Skagit were very great. Millions of feet of logs have been forced into solid jams at the various points near the mouth of the river, and these can only be removed at very low stages of the river and during the highest June tides.

—The Mormon semi-annual conference is now in session at Salt Lake, and has a daily attendance of about 8,000. On Sunday last the principal speaker was George Q. Cannon, delegate to congress from Utah, who upheld polygamy and said that every man should marry and keep marrying till every woman had a husband. He reasoned thus as one of this great family of Mormon polygamists, and not as a member of congress, and had a right to say as a father that his daughters should thus marry. This was his religion, and he would make his children swear to live up to it.
