Foreign News.

The etcamer Gilloct from Hamburg for New York, which came in collision Sunday with the ship Rosella Smith, from New York, has arrived at Schillh. No lives lost.

Advices from Cape Town say that Lord Chelmsford's camp near Ekowe was attacked on the 3d of April by 11,000 Zulus, but that they were repulsed and pursued with great loss; 470 Zulus were killed. Lieut. Johnson, of the 23th, infantry, was killed and Cel. North and Col. Czealock were wounded. The Zulus fought bravely, advancing within 30 yards of the entrenchments. The attack lasted nearly an hour, when the Zulus retreated precipitately, followed by mounted infantry and the native contingent.

To Surveyor General Tolman the Oregonian is indebted for a copy of the bill, and also for the following suggestions as to advantages gained by settlers under it:

Settlers who are, or may hereafter find themselves outside of the surveys (and there are many already) and who may wish to avail themselves of the benefit. of the homestead law, without pur-chase, can make deposit, have their land surveyed, and then sell and transfer their certificates of deposit to any one desiring to purchase their pre-emption

This land script will be as good as money to any one who may wish to enter land under this law, and will be ready sale. And further, it will operate to extend the public surveys, which are much needed, under larger contracts, thus saving the expense of a multitude of maps, with consequent less cost to the government.
