TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

Eastern States.

A number of persons will be arrested at Pocasset, Mass., as accessories to the killing of Freeman's child.

Strenuous exertions are being made by the war and interior departments to prevent the proposed invasion of the Indian territory.

Advices from south eastern Kansas say about 2000 men have gone into the Indian territory within the past week, and also that silver mines have been discovered just south of the Kansas line. Claims in large numbers are being registered daily in the squatter's registry office two miles from Baxter springs, Kansas.

The following is the text of a bill introduced by Ladd in the house at Washington on the 5th:

WHEREAS, The presence of troops at the polls is contrary to the spirit of our institutions and the traditions of our people, and tends to destroy the freedom of elections. Therefore be it enacted, etc., that it shall not be lawful to bring to or employ at any place, where a general or special election is being held in a state, any part of the army or navy of the United States, unless such force be necessary to repel armed enemies of the United States, or to enforce section 4, article 4 of the constitution of the United States and laws made in pursuance thereof on application of legislature or executive of state where such force is to be used, and so much of the laws as is inconsistent therewith, is hereby repealed.

A statue in memory of Dr. Livingston was recently unveiled in Glasgow.

Tennyson has suggested to Herkomer, the English painter, a picture of Merlin and Vivien.

The city of Dublin has seventeen statues of noted men and four more in process of erection.

A public subscription is to be opened in Paris for the purpose of erecting a statue to Beranger. Victor Hugo is president of the committee.

Tantardini, who lately died at Milan, was a very prominent sculpture of the modern school. His works may be found in nearly every treasury of the fine arts in Europe. He served as juror in the fine art section of the Centennial Exposition.

Mr. Frith, painter of "Derby Day," stands forth as a powerful representative of an epoch in art that is now swiftly passing away. He is eminent among men who paint for those who like pictures—stories on canvass—without liking art.

The South Kensington Museum has lately acquired a fine example of Italian decorative sculpture, which the learned mostly agree in attributing to no less a master than Donatello. It is a sarcophagus of gray stone, with a life-size female figure at the top. It was found at Padua, where it had been used as a horse-trough.

R. W. Gilder, the poet, discovered through an advertisement a fine landscape by Turner. It was the property of a gentleman in New Jersey, who had brought the picture to this country twenty-five years ago, and wished to sell it. The canvas is three feet eight inches high, and four feet eight inches long, and "Conway Castle" is the title of the work.

It is said in Oxford that Ruskin sent in his resignation with the remark that if a jury of his countrymen had pronounced him unfit to be a critic, he could not consider himself fit to be a professor of the fine arts. In the Whistler suit, it will be remembered, he was condemned to pay one farthing damages to the aggrieved artist.

Death From a Decayed Tooth.

D. W. Clark died Monday afternoon of pyemia, or blood poison, resulting from an abscess in the jaw. It originated from caries, or ulceration of a decayed tooth, and had been coming on for five months. He was canvassing Yolo county for the patent flat-iron, and returned from there less than three weeks ago. The abscess was lance, and discharged a large quantity of foul matter, but death resulted from the cause mentioned above. Had the tooth, which created the abscess, been extracted at the proper time, he need not have lost his life.

On the re-assembling of the German Reichstag, a letter from Bismarck was presented asking leave to prosecute deputy Hasselmann for smuggling prohibited newspapers into the empire. The introduction of copies of three German newspapers published in the United States has been prohibited.
