TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

Eastern States.

It was the intention of President Hayes on the 7th to sign the bill which passed the house the day previous to prevent military interference at elections.

In the matter of the Hazen-Stanley case the New York Times says that the impression among the friends of General Stanley, who have closely watched the case, is that the verdict taken to Washington on the 6th, was acquittal.

On the night of the 7th an explosion of gas occurred at Wilkesbarre Pa. in station shaft in Lehigh and Wilkesbarre coal mine, severely burned Martin Kerrigan. At midnight while the men were brushing out the accumulation of gas in the lower vein, it came in contact with a blow, causing a terrific explosion. A large force of men were driving a tunnel at the time, and eight of them were badly burned, the majority it is thought fatally. The mine was set on fire and some 400 feet of solid coal was burning and had to be flooded.

Northwestern Indians.

A special dispatch to the Oregonian, dated Walla Walla, May 7th, states that two more companies are under marching orders to proceed to the Indian country when Chief Moses arrives. Gen. Howard will accompany the troops and place the Indians on their new reservation. It is very doubtful if peace will be permanent, for the simple reason that no provision has been made for feeding the Indians when they arrive there. Yakima settlers are very indignant. The Simcoe reservation embraces the best lands in that portion of Washington territory. Wilbur, agent of the Simcoe reserve, reports four hundred Indian farmers. There are but seventy-seven. No one has confidence in Wilbur. Nothing permanently can possibly be accomplished tending to a peaceful solution of the northwestern Indian question.

Recapture of the Perkin Murderers.

This dispatch from Walla Walla of the same date states that the Indian Perkins murderers who recently escaped from the Yakima jail, have all been re-captured and returned to jail again. Friendly Columbia river Indians have returned the horses and pack rigging taken off by the renegades who attacked the deputy sheriff as reported. They report two Indians dead, or nearly so, and the other four wounded. Russell, the wounded man, has arrived in Yakima, badly wounded, with both hands badly disabled. Troops from fort Simcoe have removed to Kittitas valley by order of Gen. Howard. The new reservation given to Chief Moses is unpopular. The citizens question the legal right of the executive department to give away this territory to the Indians after their title has been extinguished, and more or less of the lands occupied by whites for agricultural purposes; and again, because it is next to the British line which will always afford a safe retreat for all the renegades in the country. They can always find a market there for stolen horses, and obtain ammunition and supplies.

The Kearney Code in California.

The majority of the interior of the state of California is largely in favor of the adoption of the new constitution. Up to 1 o'clock A. M., May 8th, San Francisco gives 2,000 majority for it. Returns from the country are incomplete but indicate that while Alameda, Sacramento, Santa Clara and most of the mining counties have gone against, nearly all the agricultural counties have gone heavily for it.

CONTESTED LAND CLAIMS.

The following law of congress in reference to contested land claims, we publish for the information of our readers in Clatsop, Columbia, Tillamook, Umatilla and Waiilatpu counties: An act to provide for the publication of notices of contest under the homestead pre-emption, and tree culture laws of the United States. Be it enacted by the senate and house Representatives of the United States of America in congress assembled: That the notice of contest now provided by law under the homestead, pre-emption, tree-culture laws of the United States, shall after the passage of this act, be printed in some newspaper printed in the county where the land in contest lies; and if no newspaper be printed in such county, then in the newspaper printed in the county nearest such land. Approved June 4, 1878.
